



One Hundred Fifty Years is a long time, and you have weathered those years well.


Obviously, none of us knows what the future holds, but as we look back at a century and a half, we realize that we have learned from the past to face both present and future with faith and gratitude.



HISTORY OF ST. ROSE PARISH

Founding of the Parish

The year 1839 marks the foundation of four parishes in the Mercer-Auglaize County area, namely, St. Rose, St. Henry, Victoria (St. Joseph) and Wapakoneta. All the available data point to the fact that St. Rose is the oldest of the four.

In tradition, both oral and written, the story is told which deals with the origin of the name. Once, when the Most Rev. John Purcell, Bishop of Cincinnati, was passing through the eastern part of Mercer County on one of his visitation tours, he was enraptured by the dazzling beauty of the woodland scene. Wild roses grew everywhere. He saw it as a garden designed and planted by the Creator. In admiration, the Bishop called the spot Rose Garden, and the little village which later sprang up in this section was given its name.

St. Augustine's parish of Minster had as its two oldest daughters St. John's parish of Maria Stein (1837) and St. Michael's parish of Ft. Loramie (1838). In 1839, it became the mother-parish of St. Rose. It was during the late 1830's that a number of families living in and around the little village met, and St. Rose parish was organized and preparations made for the erection of a home of worship. Prior to the year 1844, religious services were held in a farm house, the home of Mr. Joseph Kleinhenz.

Scarcity of priests in the diocese of Cincinnati made regular services impossible. In 1839, the same year that St. Rose was founded, Bishop Purcell visited Europe in order to obtain additional priests to help care for the scattered Catholics of his diocese, which included all of the State of Ohio. Father Louis Navarron, from the diocese of Clermont, France, was one of the party of seven priests who landed in New York on August 22, 1839. Bishop Purcell sent him to attend to the spiritual needs of the French Catholics in Versailles. Until 1845, this zealous French missionary also made frequent trips to St. Rose.

In 1843, Bishop Purcell went again to Europe to recruit help, and he obtained the Society of the Precious Blood to tend to the German speaking members of his diocese. Father Francis Brunner, C.PP.S., and seven other C.PP.S. priests and seven students arrived at Cincinnati on January 1, 1844 and were sent to the northern part of Ohio (near Norwalk). In 1845, they were assigned to the Mercer County area, which included the parish of St. Augustine in Minster, which had been founded in 1834.


In the parish archives there is a copy of a lease (never recorded in the Recorder's Office in Celina) dated April 11, 1839, made between Arnold Pieper and Joseph Kleinhenz and the trustees for the German Roman Catholic Church, viz., Henry Lochtefeld, Henry Raudirkes, Henry Nichting and Herman Henry Goettemoeller. This lease is for the property thus described: "Beginning at the South West corner of the

East half of the South East quarter of Section 21, Township 7, Range 3 East — from thence East on the Section line to a stake on said line 35 feet east of the east extreme of the church now erected thereon from thence due north, etc."

Thus the first place of worship was on the north side of the present S.R. 119, and this was already built in 1839. A recorded deed, dated April 9, 1842, records the sale of one half of an acre of land by Joseph Kleinhenz to Bishop Purcell in Section 21. A deed, dated March 5, 1845, records the sale of an additional three acres; and a deed, dated June 17, 1854, records the purchase of another four acres.

On April 9, 1842, Bishop Purcell also purchased ten acres from John Schlarman for \$14.00 — out of the northwest corner of the east half of the northeast quarter of section 28 (south S.R. 119).

In June of 1854, the land purchased by Bishop Purcell was surveyed and divided into sixteen lots. There were eight lots to the north and eight to the south of St. Rosa Street (present S.R. 119). Each lot was to be 51'9" wide and 6.43 chains (424'3") deep. St. Rosa Street was to be 60' wide. The western edge of this village of Rose Garden was to be 20.10 chains (1,326'6") from the eastern line of sections 21 and 28.



Under the capable direction of Father Navarron the first log church was erected at Rose Garden in 1844. Unimposing as was the architecture of that first log church, it nevertheless stood out above the other log cabins that surrounded it, for it possessed a steeple, and in the steeple a bell purchased for the sum of \$36.00. On November 24, 1844, Father Navarron dedicated the little log church and blessed the cemetery — an occasion of great rejoicing for the seventy-eight families that constituted the parish.

The first baptism in this church was of Joseph Benard Schwieterman on December 22, 1844 by Father Navarron. The first recorded marriage was solemnized by Father Friederich Broenner on January 25, 1848, between John H. Moeller and Elizabeth Ungruhn. The first recorded death to occur was on April 29, 1845 when B. Michael Surmann, aged 40, passed away.

The year that the death-dealing cholera swept through Ohio like a blight (1848), the Fathers C.PP.S. were in constant demand everywhere. None worked more valiantly than they to stem the onrush of this dread disease and to confer the last rites of Holy Mother Church on the dying. In this priestly work of mercy, they were aided at St. Rose by Father Friederich Broenner, formerly a missionary of the Carmelite order. Father Broenner was pastor of St. Rose and at the same time of St. Henry; he died on December 29, 1849 and is buried in St. Rose Cemetery.

It is worthy of mention that in order to meet the needs of the people, St. Rose became the mother parish in 1847 of the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin in Cassella (then called Marysville) and in 1851 of St. Sebastian. (Precious Blood in Chickasaw was founded in 1895, also formerly part of St. Rose.)





Building of the Second Church

As the years went quickly by and in passing showed a yearly increase in the congregation, the log church became too small. The congregation soon realized that the house of prayer and worship had

served its purpose, and that soon more commodious quarters would have to be erected. In 1851, preparations were made for the building of a new church.

On August 10, 1851, the first assembly met to decide the building of a new church. On August 17 there was another assembly to select the building committee and determine the building site. Named to the committee were Johan Heinrich Raudirkes, Theodor Woeste, Georg Leugers, Heinrich Hagedorn, Joseph Koenig, Joseph Kleinhenz, Gerhard Stever as overseer and Johan Hagerdorn as treasurer.

The committee advertized twice in the German paper Wahrheitsfreund for bids on the bricks needed. The bid was accepted on February 19, 1852 at \$2.39 per thousand. These bricks were to be made at the site where the church was to stand, and according to the agreement Friederich Klinghammer was given the contract, and he promised to have them finished in the year 1852.

Meanwhile the necessary firewood was to be delivered by the parishioners, as well as the heavy wood for the roof. The contractor had to see to the necessary water himself, but if it had to be dug deeper than ten feet, then the parishioners were to help. After the contractor had completed the entire work — if the bricks were good — he was to be paid in full.

The parish decided that the church should be 76 feet long and 42 feet wide, and that there be two doors at the front end and with two aisles in the interior leading to the altar.

The stones which were to be used for the foundation as well as the door and window stones, had to be brought via the canal from Piqua and had to be hauled from Minster. Likewise the necessary boards had to be brought from Minster. The necessary sand, fortunately, was available in a creek at Bernard Grevenkamp's place, and was hauled from there.

It was decided at the meeting on St. Lawrence day (August 10, 1852) that a small change be made in the plans of the church. This change was handed over to the pastor, to the teacher Gerhard Heinrich Panning, to Gerhard Stever and to Joseph Kleinhenz:

- 1. That the windows be made so that the panes be 8 by 10 inches, and that the format be like that of St. John's;
- 2. That only one large door be made at the towered end, and one side door; that there be one large aisle five feet wide, and two side aisles three feet wide;
- 3. That the sacristy door at the upper end be in the center so that it would lead to both rooms;
- 4. That there be two windows next to the door at the towered (west) end, and the inscription stone be above the large door;
- 5. That the foundation wall be put out on bids and be ready before the winter.

Note: The inscription stone that was on this church is now to be found next to the sidewalk — at ground level — on the northwest side of the present church.

On August 15, 1852, the cornerstone was laid and blessed by Father Andrew Kunkler. On August 29, 1852, it was decided that bids for the mason (wall) work, the rough wood work and the carpentry work for the new church be let on September 29, 1852. On October 4, 1852, the bids were opened. A. Van der Broeke got the mason work at \$415.00, Anton De Curtins got the carpentry work at \$228.00 and he also got the lumber work at \$765.75.

On January 18, 1854, the structure was dedicated with great solemnity. The church was built at a cost of \$6,000.00 and was built free of debt.

In 1862, the first organ was installed for \$690.00. At the same time statues of St. Rose, St. John, St. Lawrence and the Good Shepherd, all imported from Europe, were purchased for \$315.00. In 1853, the bells had been purchased for \$544.00. They were blessed by Father Kunkler. In 1873, the church was reroofed for \$540.00. In 1885, the tower and the church were painted for \$1,026.50. At the same time new windows for the church were purchased — each one costing \$28.00. The large crucifix and statues of the Blessed Virgin, St. Joseph, St. Francis and St. Anthony were received.

Golden Jubilee of the First Church

On November 24, 1894, the parish celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of the first church. Of the early pioneers only two old men were present for the festive occasion, which was a gala day for the pastor, Father Aloys Malin, and members of the parish. These two men were Bernard Holdheide, 79 years, and Henry Boeckman of Cassella, 84 years. Mrs. Elizabeth Goettemoeller, 94 years, could not be present because of paralysis. In order to render the day ever memorable, the Very Reverend Provincial, Father Henry Drees, delivered the sermon in the Low German dialect.

Building of the Rectory

It is interesting to note that during the years 1846-1848 and 1850-1881 the pastors were changed very frequently. As a matter of fact it is almost impossible to determine who was the one in charge. This was due in part to the fact that St. Rose did not have a residence for the pastor. The attending priests resided at the Gruenenwald convent at Cassella (still standing — about a half mile south of S.R. 119 on Cassella-Montezuma Road) or at the Maria Stein convent. In 1905, when Archbishop Henry Moeller was on a visitation tour, he expressed his desire that a rectory should be built near the church so that the pastor could live

among his flock. At once the newly appointed pastor, Father Liberat Schupp, proceeded to carry out the wish of the Archbishop. Preparations were made for the building of a rectory.

The contract for the building was let in June 1905, and the work was awarded to Mr. H. Forthhoff, for the sum of \$3,635.00. The pastor himself superintended the erection of the new building. "It is built of pressed brick, it is two stories high and contains ten rooms, also all modern conveniences, such as hot water heating, acetelyne light, etc." The building was completed at the cost of \$6,000.00, and on March 23, 1906 the pastor moved into his new residence.

Building of the Third Church

What was probably the most extensive improvement in the history of the parish was undertaken during the year 1910. In January of that year Father Liberat Schupp placed before the congregation the necessity of building a new church. A meeting of the parishioners was called and a unanimous resolution was passed to erect a new church. In order to procure the necessary money, a subscription was taken up which, within a week's time, amounted to \$21,479.00 — another striking proof of that spirit of generosity and sacrifice which seems to pervade the entire history of the parish.

A building committee was chosen by acclamation and the following members were elected: B. Evers, H. Goettemoeller, Joseph Homan, A. Selhorst, B. Tuente, Theodor Evers, H. Harting, John Lochtefeld, Math. Harting and Fred Stucky. Mr. H. Moeller was chosen as treasurer.

Plans were then made by Mr. A. De Curtins of Lima, Ohio. The date for the opening of the bids was set for June 15, 1910. Due to the fact that all bids for the contract were exorbitant, the pastor with his committee concluded, after careful consideration, to erect the building by piece work: the contract for the mason's work was let out to Joseph Vonder Hirst of Celina for \$4,200.00, and that of the carpenter's work to Jacob Notter of Wendelin for \$2,775.00. On May 21, 1911, the cornerstone was laid by the Very Reverend Provincial, Father Boniface Russ; the church was completed the following year and the Most Reverend Archbishop Henry Moeller dedicated it on September 8, 1912. The church is a magnificent building constructed of pressed brick with Bedford stone trimmings. Its high and sharply pointed arches are of the Gothic style of architecture.

Diamond Jubilee of the First Church

On Thursday, November 27, 1919, was celebrated the seventy-fifth anniversary of the dedication of the first church in the St. Rose Congregation, which culminated the organization of the parish.

This occasion was fittingly celebrated by a Solemn High Mass sung by the Rev. Richard Schwietermann, of the St. Mary's Novitiate at Burkettsville. Owing to the fact that it was Thanksgiving Day many of the invited priests could not be present. Especially did the pastor (Father Schmaus) and the congregation regret that Father Liberat Schupp, pastor of Glandorf, Ohio, the builder of the church and rectory, was not able to attend the jubilee.





The Very Reverend Provincial, Father George Hindelang, pastor of Immaculate Conception Church, Celina, gave a very eloquent address both narrative and instructive of the history of the Catholic Church in the southern part of Mercer County in general and of the history of St. Rose Congregation in particular. He very vividly pictured the Catholic missionary life. He also spoke very endearingly in loving memory of that good and pious priest, Father Caspar Schedler, who for eleven years was the pastor of St. Rose parish.

The St. Rose choir, under the direction of the organist, Albert H. Dorsten, rendered a very appropriate program. A new Mass, St. Rosa de Lima Mass, with new benediction hymns, were sung on this occasion. The Te Deum was sung by all and accompanied by the Minster band.

After the church services a genuine Thanksgiving Day dinner was ready and was served by the ladies. Music was furnished by the Minster and Cassella bands. As the weather did not allow any outdoor activities they were transplanted to the spacious and electrically lighted St. Lawrence Hall and the school building. Here everything was cozy, dry and pleasant, and a large church bazaar was held in comparatively small space. The bazaar was a complete success financially. These returns together with the very liberal subscriptions taken up by the pastor among the parishioners during the previous weeks, was enough to wipe out the debt of \$5,000.00 remaining on the building of the new church. This, above all, led the people to be jubilant and thankful.

Together with the pastor, Father Schmaus, the following committees were instrumental in helping this diamond jubilee to be a great success: Bernard Evers, Sr., Henry Moeller, Henry Hartings, Henry Goettemoeller, Joseph Homan, Joh. W. Kleinhenz, Mrs. John

Fortkamp, Mrs. Herman Ungruhn, Mrs. Fred Goettemoeller, Mrs. Josephine Albers, Miss Helen Bomholt and Miss Rose Goettemoeller.

In connection with the jubilee a soldier's homecoming was celebrated in honor of the safe return of all the boys of the congregation from the World War. They were the guests of the congregation.



Summary 1979-1989

Since the publication of the History of St. Rose in 1979 by Fr. Milton Ballor, C.PP.S., the following additions might be added to bring up to date what has transpired since the building of the present church. Under able pastors, the church and its surroundings has not only been maintained in excellent shape but has been improved. Under their direction the cemetery wall was added to beautify it. In regard to the church the two side front doors have been replaced, a ramp was installed on the east side for the ease of the elderly and disabled. A passage way between the rectory and church was closed in for the convenience of the pastor and others wishing to use the entrance to the basement. Also the church's interior has been redecorated with taste and made more functional for liturgical usage. The rectory as well as the sidewalks and grounds have undergone renovations under the various pastors. On the whole the peoples' dedication and love for their church

has been manifested by their continual desire to make the place beautiful in appearance. The latest example of their pride as members of St. Rose is the newly erected sign in the front of the church.

These physical changes and improvements only reflect a part of St. Rose parish history. And perhaps not the most important part of their growth. Along with it comes the important part that makes them a church in the first place, namely their spiritual life growth.

Two big events in their lifetime as a parish influenced this change and growth. First the Second Vatican Council called for renewal and change that has effected not only St. Rose but the whole church. The second factor that brought about a significant change in the life of St. Rose parish was The Harvest Program of the Diocese which called for a committment of each parish in the diocese as to its desire to stay open as a parish or merge with another.

The Vatican Council called for an update in the peoples' participation in the life of the church. Introduced to achieve these goals was a change in the worshipping life of the parish. In the year 1959, St. Rose parish had its first dialog Mass and singing of the four hymns followed. In 1962 the present organ was purchased to help the people better participate in singing and praying. In 1965 parts of the Mass were permitted to be said in English which called for readers at Mass. Changes in the Eucharistic fast enabled more and more people to receive Holy Communion and thus necessitated the introduction of lay distributors of Communion. Finally all the parts of the Mass were translated into English and the missalettes replaced the Missals that the people used when the Mass was in Latin. More songs were added and the people were urged to sing their parts in the liturgy. The Council's demand for more active participation did not end with liturgy but spread to the entire life of the church. Parish Councils were established as well as all the Commissions a parish deemed necessary to give service to the people of the parish. In 1976 Saturday evening Mass began at St. Rose for those who because of work could not attend on Sunday.

For the Harvest brought a more urgent demand that the parishioners become involved in the parish and accept their responsibility to minister to each other in St. Rose parish. This demanded in St. Rose, a need for leaders to be responsible for the various ministries in the church's worshipping life. Also to head the CCD Programs and other needed programs. Especially will this be necessary as they begin to share a pastor with Cassella as called for by the Harvest Program.

Much has been left out of this short addition to the St. Rose History and much will be written in the future as history is made. Let this only indicate that St. Rose Parish is very much alive and growing in Christ.

Religious Vocations

Eighty-eight years had passed and St. Rose had given none of her sons to the Holy Priesthood; but the seeds of vocation had been planted.

It was indeed a happy event when Father Ferdinand Goettemoeller, C.PP.S., was ordained at Carthagena on May 26, 1927. It was a day of greater celebration when he sang his First Solemn High Mass at St. Rose on May 28, 1927.

The complete list of vocations to the priesthood and religious life from St. Rose follows:

Father Ferdinand Goettemoeller, C.PP.S., born March 7, 1898, son of Henry and Catherine (Woehrmann) Goettemoeller, ordained May 26, 1927. Father Goettemoeller died October 25, 1971.

Father Melchior Lochtefeld, C.PP.S., born January 4, 1905, son of John and Catherine (Hoying) Lochtefeld, ordained May 14, 1931. He died July 27, 1984.

Father Aloys Selhorst, C.PP.S., born November 16, 1912, son of Anthony and Catherine (Albers) Selhorst, ordained May 7, 1939. Father Selhorst died in a rectory fire at Manteca, California, on August 23, 1967.

Father Tobias Lochtefeld, born February 23, 1922, son of Vincent and Matilda (Reinhard) Lochtefeld, ordained May 18, 1948. Father Lochtefeld died in an airplane accident in Brainerd, Minnesota on August 26, 1956.

(Note: The following were baptised, but not raised, in St. Rose.) Father John Anthony, born June 7, 1896, son of Hugo and Gertrude (Miller) Anthony, ordained May 26, 1923. Father Anthony died December 3, 1960.

Father John Reichert, born March 1, 1898, son of Joseph and Philomena (Hagedorn) Reichert, ordained June 11, 1927. Father Reichert died May 12, 1976.

Sister Angelica, C.PP.S., born Mary Lochtefeld, August 15, 1855, daughter of Henry and Bernadine (Gresshoff) Lochtefeld, entered the convent on January 1, 1873. Sister Angelica died February 20, 1902.

Sister Agatha, C.PP.S., born Rosina Philomena Lochtefeld September 22, 1858, daughter of Henry and Bernardine (Gresshoff) Lochtefeld, entered the convent March 16, 1882. Sister Agatha died January 7, 1928.

Sister Emma, S.F.P., born Catherine Bernardine Lochtefeld November 29, 1894, daughter of John and Catherine (Hoying) Lochtefeld, entered the convent November 29, 1917. Sister Emma died March 19, 1928.

Sister Leonidas, C.PP.S., born Agnes Piekenbrock February 14, 1918, daughter of Frank and Catherine (Luttmer) Piekenbrock, entered the convent August 13, 1939.

Description of St. Rose Church

The cornerstone of the present church was blessed on May 21, 1911. The dimensions of the church, based on the blueprints of the architect Andrew De Curtins of Lima, Ohio, are: length — 115', width at front — 51', width at transept — 63', height of roof — 55' and height of steeple cross — 133'. The altars, communion rail, confessional and pews were built by the E. Hackner Company of LaCross, Wisconsin. The art glass windows were purchased from the Emil Frei Company of St. Louis, Missouri. The church was blessed on September 8, 1912.

High Altar

The high altar was bought in 1913 at a cost of \$1,565.00. The upper part of the reredos contains a statue of St. Rose. On the east side is a Crucifixion scene and on the west side is a Resurrection scene. In the mensa are an Emmaus scene and varous symbols of the passion — crown of thorns and nails, veil and face of Christ, tunic and dice, and ladder, sponge and rope. (Note: On the original altar there were also statutes of St. Peter and St. Paul and also two standing angels with lights. In 1920, additional "towers" and angels, plus two kneeling angels with lights on pedestals were added. All of these were removed when the altar was lowered three steps and placed against the south wall in 1971.) On the door of the tabernacle is enscribed: "Altar and Tabernacle Gift of the Evers Relationship." The tabernacle was replaced in 1938. The additions to the high altar (and also the side altars) were bought in 1920 at a cost of \$1,690.00.

Blessed Virgin Altar

In the east transept is an altar in honor of the Blessed Virgin Mary. On the reredos is a statue of the Blessed Virgin Queen and the Christ Child, which had been in the old church. On the east side of this statue is one of St. Catherine of Alexandria, and on the west side one of St. Barbara. In the mensa is an Annunciation scene. On the tabernacle is a plaque stating: "In memory of Theodore and Catherine Brockman 1920."

St. Joseph Altar

In the west transept is the altar in honor of St. Joseph. On the reredos is a statue of St. Joseph (from the old church). On the east side of it is one of St. Lawrence and on the west side is one of St. Anthony. In the mensa is a scene of the death of St. Joseph. There is a plaque on the tabernacle stating: "Gift of the St. Joseph and St. Lawrence Societies 1920."

The Apse

On the ceiling of the apse are five paintings: in the center Christ the Good Shepherd and two angels on each side. On the walls are paintings of the Evangelists: St. Matthew (and boy), St. Mark (and lion), St. Luke (and ox) and St. John (and eagle). In the center of the ceiling is an art glass window depicting the Holy Spirit in the form of a dove.

East Transept

Above the Blessed Virgin altar is a painting (by Father Paulinus Trost, C.PP.S.) of Christ visiting Mary and Martha. On the east wall of the transept is an art glass window depicting the birth of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Above the scene is the monogram of Mary. On each side of the window is a painting of the Old Testament prophets, Daniel and Ezechiel. On the north wall is a medallion with the Chi (X) and Rho (P) and the Alpha and Omega. East of the Blessed Virgin altar is a wall pedestal with a statue of the Sacred Heart, and next to it a painting of an angel. On the window is the inscription: "In memoriam Frauen Verein." Above the window is a medallion of the Holy Spirit in the form of a dove.

West Transept

In the west transept, above the St. Joseph altar, is a painting (also by Father Trost) of Christ blessing the children. On the west wall is an art glass window depicting the death of St. Joseph. Above the scene is the monogram of St. Joseph. On each side is a painting of the Old Testament prophets: Isaiah and Jeremiah. Above the window is a medallion of the Lamb of the Apocalypse. On the north wall is a medallion of a sunflower. Next to the St. Joseph altar is a statue of St. Gaspar del Bufalo, C.PP.S., and next to it a painting of an angel. The inscription on the window is: "In memoriam Maener Verein." On the St. Gaspar statue is a plaque stating: "In memory of Dahlinghaus family."








West

The Nave

High on the walls of the nave are medallions (four on each side). On the east side are: pillar and whip, cross with INRI, cross and chalice, and veil with face of Christ. On the west side are: ladder and lance and sponge and dice and nails, cross and pierced hand, bread and fish, and the pellican.

On the dome of the nave are paintings of the four great doctors of the West: St. Augustine (north), St. Jereome (east), St. Gregory (south) and St. Ambrose (west).

In the former baptistry (near the front entrance) is an art glass window with the inscription "In memoriam Faml. Frank Fortkamp." In the choir loft are two art glass windows both inscribed: "In memoriam Faml. H. Dwenger." In the center of the north wall (under the steeple) is an art glass window with the inscription: "In memoriam Faml. B. Piekenbrock."

The Way of the Cross

The stations of the cross were purchased in 1914 for \$668.61 and were erected by Father Paulinus Trost, C.PP.S. (delegate of Archbishop Moeller) on February 11, 1915. The way fo the cross begins on the southeast corner of the nave. These are the inscriptions on them (plus the titles in German): 1. Familie Clune, 2. John Fortkamp, 3. H. Dwenger, 4. Frank Bomholt, 5. John Stuke u. Sohn, 6. Herman Schwegman, 7. Theo. u. Kath. Brockman, 8. Ant. Meiring u. Mutter, 9. John Loechtefeld, 10. Fred. u. Hein. Goettemoeller, 11. Bern. Albers u. Sohn Clemens, 12. Heinrich Moeller, 13. Joseph Homan, 14. Jos. Meier u. B. Evers.

The Sanctuary

In the sanctuary are the altar of sacrifice, the pulpit and the presidential chair. These were made from the former communion rail. In the mensa of the altar is the wood-carved scene of Melchisedech offering bread and wine for Abraham. On the pulpit is a wood-carved scene of Moses and the people gathering Manna. (These two scenes had been the gates of the communion rail.) On the pulpit is the inscribed plaque: "Donated by Jos. Homan Sr." The two credence tables were made from the pedestals on which kneeling angels with lights had been placed next to the high altar.

In the choir loft is a large cross, with a statue of the Blessed Virgin at the foot of the cross. On it is painted the inscription: "Mission 1-8 Decem. 1912." (Note: This cross was in the old church; thus the date must have been added later.)

Near the entrance of the church is a statue of St. Theresa, the Little Flower. A plaque on it states: "In loving memory of Amalia Lorshetter presented by her son Frank Lorshetter." This statue is now placed in the northeast corner of the nave. In the northwest corner of the nave is a statue of the Pieta (purchased in 1914 with a pedestal for \$170.00).

The Bells

In the tower are three bells, weighing respectively 1800 lbs., 1350 lbs. and 900 lbs. All have the same inscription: "E.W. Vanduzen Company, Cincinnati 1932." They were purchased in 1932 for the sum of \$543.26 and blessed on May 29, 1932.

The Sacristy

In the sacristy is a monstrance with the inscription: "Geschenk von H. Moeller u. Familie." One ciborium is inscribed: "Gift of the Charles C. Bruns family," and another: "In memory of William and Elizabeth Schaefer." One chalice is inscribed: "In memory of Vincent and Mathilda Lochtefeld," and another: "Thobias Lochtefeld, from my parents, May 18, 1948."

14, 1984.





Lowell and Marian Homan Family





Werner is now retired and his youngest son, James, is the manager.




