MERCER COUNTY WAS ORGANIZED IN 1824.

Granville Township

Granville Township is one of fourteen Townships in Mercer County. The current population of the Township is 3,692. The Township boundary lines are north to the Township line which is just north of Carthagena Road, east to State Route 127, south to Mercer-Darke County line and west to Township Line Road. There are approximately 91 miles or roads in Granville Township of which the Township is responsible for 29.12 miles. The remaining roads are either County roads or State highways.

Granville Township has four elected officials which includes three Trustees and a Clerk/Treasurer. The three Trustees are each elected to a four year term. They are responsible for all Township road maintenance. This maintenance includes plowing snow, patching roads and mowing along these roads. The Trustees also settle fence disuptes among land owners, solve waterway problems, maintain the Township equipment and have other miscellaneous duties. The Clerk/Treasurer is also elected to a four year term. The Clerk/Treasurer's responsibilities include recording the minutes, preparing the annual financial reports, receiving and depositing funds, issuing warrants and other duties.

The buildings owned by Granville Township are both located in St. Henry. The small building on Walnut Street, east of the church, is known as the Township house. It is used predominately as a meeting room for the Township Trustees. The building also housed the Granville Township-St. Henry Branch Library for several years. The other building owned by Granville Township is located on Columbus Street. It was purchased from John Laux in 1978 and is used for storage of all the road equipment.

The budget for Granville Township is approximately \$100,000 a year. The bulk of these monies are obtained from property taxes, gasoline tax, motor vehicle tax, revenue sharing and inheritance settlements. The main expenditures are road related. For example, the cost of blacktopping a mile of road is \$22,000. Granville Township also provides money each year to support the St. Henry and Burkettsville Fire Departments. Mercer Country Ambulance Service also receives funds from Granville Township. Buying road equipment and maintaining it is another major expense.

The most memorable happening in Granville Township in the past decade was the blizzard of 1978. The blizzard occurred in late January. All the roads in the Township were closed. The snow was drifted so deep that the Township snow removal equipment was unable to clean the roads. The Trustees had to hire local heavy equipment operators to clear the roads. Payloaders and bulldozers were needed and it was a very costly clean up that took nearly ten days to have all Township roads open for travel.

Local economy in Granville Township as of the writing is generally good. Many of the residents work in factories in Coldwater, Celina, Minster and New Bremen. Agriculture however is the backbone of the Granville Township economy. The farmers' crops in recent years have been good but the price paid to the farmer has declined. The current price for soybeans is \$4.50 and the price of corn is \$1.50 a bushel. Operating a farm in recent years has been very costly. The average cost for land is \$1900 an acre. Machinery costs have risen as has the price of fertilizer.

In summary, Granville Township is a good place to live and raise children. People work together to form a sense of community pride. The elected Trustees and Clerk/Treasurer represent these people in the best possible way. Township government is the "grass roots" form of government that hopefully will last forever.

Henrich Romer laid out the town of St. Henry, Ohio, July 7, 1837. There is no written record available which identifies why he chose to name this town St. Henry.

St. Henry, Ohio is located in Section 21, Granville Township, Mercer County, Ohio. The Romer brothers erected the first log building and in the hastily contructed home, seven families spent their first winter. Henry Bruns built the second cabin in St. Henry. In 1839, there were enough settlers in St. Henry to lead Biship Purcell to grant permission for the formation of a parish and Mass was celebrated once a month in the Henry Beckman home. Under the direction of Rev. Louis Navarron, the first church was built, being fifty by twenty-five feet and made of logs and weatherboards. The Most Reverend Archbishop Purcell dedicated this church in 1842, to the honor of Saint Henry, the pious Emperor Henry II of Germany. Incidentally, four of the first six church wardens were named Henry: Henry Romer, Henry Bruns, Henry Wimmers, Henry Hemmelgarnn, Gerard Beckmann and Bernard Romer. Also, another settler was named Henry, that of Henry Beckman whose home had hosted the monthly Mass.

An early businessman was John Joseph Romer, who had arrived in Mercer County in October 1838 and initiated a store in St. Henry in 1840. Before completion of the Miami Erie Canal, he transported farm produce to Cincinnati by wagon and returned with merchandise for his store. For example, he took furs, dried venison, rabbit, quail, roots and herbs, e.g., snakeroot and seed turnips; Romer would return with rice, coffee, crackers, sugar, vinegar, starch, oatmeal, paints and varnish. Romer used a four horse team to haul goods between Cincinnati and home; the trip requiring three or four days. The completion of the Miami and Erie Canal in western Ohio, not only cut Romer's travel time in half, but also provided the inexpensive and quick transportation for German settlers arriving at Cincinnati and heading north to purchase land for a dollar and a quarter an acre, north of the Greenville Treaty Line. (For local citizens, the Fort Recovery-Minster Road runs along this Line.) Many immigrants worked on the building of the canal, in order to make enough money to then purchase land.

Due to the rapid settlement of the German immigrants, the population of St. Henry increased. By 1880, the St. Henry Census was registered at 200. The 1880's was the decade that changed the economic direction of St. Henry. The Cincinnati and Jackson, Michigan Railroad reached St. Henry, the second Wednesday of December, 1883. This railroad provided quick, inexpensive transportation to the market for the farmers, as well as the businessmen. The railroads soon replaced the canals for transportation. In St. Henry, Frank Bruns opened a livery stable, enlarged his saloon to make space for a pool table and placed a lantern in front of his business that year. Next to Bruns' Hotel, was the

Carriage and Wagon Manufactory of blacksmith Henry Bruns. Caspar Schoeneberger worked as a blacksmith. The Moeder brothers operated their sawmill. Anton Mueller made furniture and built homes. Joseph Drahman had a harness manufactory. John Henry Romer had a general mercantile store. John Panning was a dealer in stoves, tinware, roofing and spouting. J.B. Kipp put his saloon on wheels in 1884 and moved it next to the railroad station. Michael Schlegel manufactured furniture and carried on the undertaking business. Albert Gulde embarked in the general merchandise business. Henry Steinlage operated a tannery. Ignatz Siegrist had a harness shop. The town also had a flour mill in 1884. Dr. William Jones was the local physician and surgeon. Medical needs were also served by Dr. Adam Edelman, Dr. Ryan and Dr. J.J. Mory. Over Christmas in 1884, the roof of the tile company collapsed due to snow. The increase in village activity was evident as the 1890 Census was marked at 692. By 1890, the underground natural gas wells were dug. Many people began digging gas wells and using gas in their homes. The Natural Gas Co. was incorporated in 1892 in order to furnish gas for the village, including the school. The Citizens Gas Co. was formed and by 1894 was free of debt, paying the dividends of eleven percent. As the old village gas well began failing, a new derrick was built and the well dug in 1898.

The election for incorporation of St. Henry Village was held August 17, 1901, with 71 votes cast; 54 for and 17 against incorporation. The proceedings of incorporation were presented for record August 21 and were recorded September 9, 1901 at the Mercer County Court House. Nominations for village offices were made in October and the following gentlemen were elected to office in November 1901: Mayor Jacob Bany, Sr.; Marshal Joseph Schoeneberger; Treasurer Edward F. Romer; Clerk H.A. Beckman; Council Members: J.H. Romer, A. Gulde, Caspar Schoeneberger, Joseph Moeller, Joseph Davis and J.A. Schirack. They held their first St. Henry Village Council Meeting November 21, 1901. By January 20, 1902, within two months, a total of thirty-eight ordinances had been adopted. They also appointed a Board of Health. New jail cells were installed in the town hall by March 1902.

As various fires consumed buildings, the Village Council discussed purchasing fire-fighting equipment. But it took the fire of July 1905, which almost burned down the town, to initiate action for a fire department. This fire consumed the Bruns' Livery Stable, the Bruns Hotel, the Bruns Carriage and Smith's workshops and nearby buildings. The following week, citizens and the Village Council met and decided to organize a Fire Department. At the July 31 meeting, the Village Council made a motion for purpose of issuing bonds in the amount of \$6,000 for City Hall and Fire Protection. By September, the Council had bought a chemical fire apparatus. By November, John Losekamp had completed

his contract of building the town building. By the autumn of 1909, the water works were completed and the tower and tank erected.

The Village streets were lighted by gas lights. In 1915, the Village Council passed a motion to pay \$4,000 to Jaspensen Supply Company for completion of an electric light plant. The citizens received two hours of electricity a day, from 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m.; the generators being ran by gasoline engines.

The 1900 Village Census was listed at 650; the 1910 Census at 560. The 1920 Census was listed at 561; the 1930 Census was 571. Thus, the Village population was stabilizing.

The first decade after Incorporation, the Village implemented improvements by constructing sidewalks and curbing, allowing for proper drainage, repairing and cleaning streets, repairing street lamps, giving adequate care to ditches and water the streets with the sprinkler to control dust. The Village newspaper, The Saint Henry Advocate, advertised fifty businesses and expressed pride in the growth of these businesses. People were buying automobiles. January 12, 1912, the Village Council members put a speed limit on automobiles and autocycles, etc.; a limit of eight miles per hour. The June 29, 1907 Saint Henry Advocate advertised farm prices of wheat, \$.90; oats, \$.40; corn, \$.70; alsyke, \$7.00; timothy seed, \$2.00; butter, \$.14 per lb.; and eggs, \$.13 per dozen. The St. Henry Hardware Company advertised shelf and heavy hardware, paints, oils, glass, roofing, farm implements, the Baker windmill, pumps, piping and fittings, wire fencing, rock and barrel salt. April 28, 1914, a train wreck at one and a half miles north of St. Henry drew crowds. Twenty-one cars were strewn across the tracks, their contents dumped wherever the shattered cars lay.

In 1937, St. Henry Village celebrated its Centennial of the recording of the plat of St. Henry in 1837. The Village received 28,000 square feet of sidewalks, which was about one and one-half miles of new walks, under the W.P.A. in 1937.

World War II touched St. Henry. Local citizens went to serve their country. March 23, 1942, the Village Council discussed the possibility of sending interested parties to a meeting in Columbus in regards to civilian defense; no action was taken. In April, the Village Solicitor went to the Mercer County Auditor in regards to an additional allowance for civilian defense. The Council decided to change the time to Eastern War Time in the spring of 1943 and to change back the following fall. At the conclusion of World War II, a small notation was entered in the Village Council Minutes, October 8, 1945, to transfer the balance of the Civilian Defense Fund to the General Fund.

April 14, 1947, the Village Council Clerk was assigned to call the Village Solicitor to write the New York Central Railroad Company about putting blinker lights at the Main Street and Columbus Street Railroad Crossings. At the June 18, 1951 Village Council Meeting, Mayor Heitkamp again discussed lights at the Railroad Crossings. However, in March 1976, the Railroad was closed by Penn Central, and the subject of lights was no longer necessary. The 1940 Census of St. Henry Village was 556; the 1950 Census was 715.

The decade of the sixties saw changes coming to St. Henry. In the homes, kitchen appliances included dishwashers, trash compactors, garbage disposals, charcoal grills and microwave ovens. The Village initiated the first Saint Patrick's Day Parade in March 1964. By 1970, despite the snow, the parade had 65 entries with an estimated crowd of 4,000 to 5,000 people. The spring-like weather in 1971 brought out people by the thousands for the March Saint Patrick's Day Parade; net receipts were unofficially listed at over \$2,500, earmarked for the St. Henry Park Fund. However, the crowds were becoming too large for the village and there were local complaints; the parade was discontinued. On the first of November 1966, a sudden snowstorm stranded motorists. Several busloads of children spent the night in area homes of farmers who kindly took them in and cared for them. Roads were gradually cleared and people returned to their usual way of life. Another improvement with the Village during the sixties was the installation of the sewage treatment plant. The extended aeration treatment plant was placed in operation in 1966 and as of December 1966, seventy percent of the potential customers were connected to the system. When the project was completed, the total cost of the program was \$445,000. The 1960 Census of the Village of St. Henry was 978; the 1970 Census was 1276.

In 1971, a group of interested Jaycees started a Pool Fund. By 1974, a total of \$13,800 was raised through a variety of projects. In 1975, a Pool Committee was formed to raise money to help the Jaycees in this project. The total cost of the swimming pool complex was approximately \$124,000; the pool was completed in time for the summer of 1975. At that time, the Pool Complex was turned over to the St. Henry Village Council. The Village Council and the community organizations and the citizens have cooperated and added improvements at the park, with new shelter houses, kiddie-land, softball fields, tennis courts, basketball area, horseshoe courts and a parking lot. A Pool Manager and Summer Recreation Director are employed.

Construction of the new water tower for St. Henry was completed in the autumn of 1971. The new water tower was 140 feet tall and held 150,000 gallons of water. The rust removal plant was completed in 1973; at a cost of \$70,000. That year, April 17, Mayor Lawrence Heitkamp resigned after 35 years of service. Robert Kanney was sworn in as Mayor. That autumn, September 24, 1973, Village Council listed to Ordinance #386, for the purpose of granting a franchise to Telemedia Company for a community television antenna in the village.

The first woman Council member, Judy Stachler, served from January 14, 1974, until March 24, 1975, when she and her family moved outside the Village. April 22, 1974, the Mercer County Commissioners contacted the Village Council about the County Wide Ambulance Service and asked for support of \$.85 per capita, about a total of \$1,000. At the November 11 meeting, Don Hummel, representing the St. Henry Fire Department, requested Councilmen to attend a County Ambulance Service meeting because St. Henry might be in line for a branch of this service. The ambulance service did come into service; their separate history is on another page of this book. By 1980, the service fee to St. Henry was \$1.92 per capita for a total of \$2,449. At the December 8, 1986 meeting, the Council was notified by the Mercer County Commissioners that the 1987 fee would be \$3,002.88, and due April 1, 1987. Since the past source of income (Federal Revenue Sharing) no longer existed, the cost would probably come from city income tax receipts. Throughout the year of 1974, as with other years, Council was faced with problems of water, e.g., in January, there was a problem of heavy amounts of surface water draining into the Village sewer system and in July there was a sewer back-up problem. November 11, 1974, Council passed Ordinance #396, permitting Eastview Estates to be annexed into the Village. December 9, 1974, Council passed Ordinance #397, implementing Municipal Income Tax.

August 25, 1975, Mayor Robert Kanney stated to the Village Council that he would be attending a Mercer County meeting for libraries, with other local residents, for a request of funds for a local library. Joyce Alig, Granville Township St. Henry Library Committee Chairperson, requested the support of the Mayor and the Village Council, for a new library.

December 22, 1975, Council read a letter from Penn-Central Railroad, which would terminate the usage of the rail service from Van Wert to Ansonia, effective February 27, 1976. Thomas Zitter, with the encouragement of Al Homan, St. Henry Tile and Al Romer of Schockman Lumber, applied for and was granted permission to operate a shortline railway between St. Henry and Celina. This operation continued until 1980. Ohio wanted a high speed railway but the voters voted against it; Ohio wasn't interested in keeping short line railroads. "The St. Henry community was very supportive, the shippers, the bank, the people; but the railroad was discontinued in 1980," commented Tom Zitter. In November 1981, the Village Council discussed the purchase of the vacant railroad land.

Blizzards of January 1977 and 1978 are remembered. People did not get home from work in January 1978 for a few days. Many families had stranded motorists staying with them. The K of C Hall on Main Street was used as a temporary shelter for stranded motorists during both storms.

The 1980 Census of the Village of St. Henry was 1596. The Council reviewed interest rates for money market certificates. The old rates were \$70,000 at 9.775 percent and \$30,000 at 14.792 percent. The new (1980) rates would be \$75,000 and \$35,000 for 10.5 percent. The 1980's Council Members were faced with responsibilities of closing ditches, property maintenance, new chain saw to clean ditches, resurfacing streets, use of the village grader, D.P.&L. rate increases, snow removal, contract for county jail service, storm sewer water, Western Ohio Cablevision, Western Ohio Gas Company, Village trash hauling with Laidlaw Waste Products, new vehicles and street curbing. June 22. 1981 a public meeting was held concerning the Village sewer system, a survey of the system and an E.P.A. grant. At the July 13, 1981 meeting Council passed the motion to apply for the sewer survey through the E.P.A. December 1981 Gerald Dippold resigned as Clerk-Treasurer and January 11, 1982 Arthur Brophy was administered the Oath of Office by Solicitor David Bruns. February 22, 1982, Board of Public Affairs member of 27 years, Ed Westgerdes resigned. In 1982, Commemorative Signs honoring Wally Post were installed at the Main Street entrances to the Village.

July 11, 1983, Council passed resolution #83-19 to levy a property tax of two mills for five years.

January 23, 1984, Council discussed the possible acquisition of land east of the Village in the Nieport-Rammel tract for development into an industrial park and future residential use. At the June 25, 1984 meeting Council agreed to purchase land from Joseph and Gertrude Nieport and Florence Rammel for the Industrial Park Development, to be known as the Oak Hill Commercial Park. In 1985, Council discussed sale of property in this park. September 22, 1986, Tom Lange Construction was hired for construction of East Washington Street from North Linn Street to Oak Hill Drive.

May 29, 1984, Paul Howell was introduced to Council; Howell would be working with St. Henry Solicitor Dave Bruns. December 1984, David Bruns' annual contract as Village Solicitor was renewed for 1985. In December 1985, Council approved employment of Attorney Paul Howell as Village Solicitor for 1986. This employment was renewed at the December 8, 1986 meeting for 1987.

The Village Council continued with responsibilities of street construction, maintenance and repair, employment of pedestrian traffic control person at Main and Walnut during school hours, insurance policies, chlorinating the water supply, the park and pool, water and sewer responsibilities. The Council members met with the Community Improvement Corporation for the purpose of retension and expansion of existing industries and attracting new industries to this area.

In the summer of 1985, the entire Main Street took on a new look, with a new blacktop, plus new concrete curbs and sidewalks. Fred

Walls did the asphalt work. Work on the curbs and sidewalks was done by B & L Construction of St. Henry. According to Street Superintendent Mike Niekamp the cost of the project was near \$300,000.

The new parking lot was completed in 1986. In 1981, Mayor Kanney was contacted by Al Homan about the possibility of installing a new parking lot at the side of the old grade school on Main Street; Al stated that, at that time, the St. Henry Bank, Hogenkamp Funeral Home and St. Henry Church were interested in the project. At the February 24, 1986 meeting, a drawing of the parking lot was presented to the Village Council. At the April 28, 1986 meeting a resolution was passed for a lease agreement between the Village of St. Henry and the St. Henry Board of Education for a new parking lot between the St. Henry Church and the Granville Township St. Henry Branch Library. Thus, with the combined financial help of Hogenkamp Funeral Home, St. Henry Bank, St. Henry Church and the Granville Township St. Henry Branch Library, the parking lot was completed in 1986. At the entrance to the parking lot, is a Memorial to Veterans of the Community. This parking lot will be used as a center of activities for the St. Henry Sesquicentennial July 4-12, 1987.



Law enforcement officers were known as Marshalls and Deputy Marshalls years ago in St. Henry and all worked on a part-time basis. The first Marshall of St. Henry was Joseph Schoeneberger. He was appointed to preserve the peace of the community, when St. Henry became incorporated in 1901. In January, 1942 the Village Council appointed William Uhlenhake as the first Chief of Police and William Bernard was appointed Assistant Chief of Police for the purpose of forming a separate department. 


East Main - looking East.



The Beckman and Gast Company 282 Kremer-Hoying Road

A canning factory has been in operation at the site of The Beckman and Gast Company since 1907. Originally the name had been The Pioneer Canning & Manufacturing Company. It changed hands several times and was finally purchased by Lewis H. Gast and Luke F. Beckman in 1928 and was incorporated as The Beckman and Gast Company in 1930. In 1950 The Beckman and Gast Company was sold to Lewis H. Gast and Sons while the Minster Canning Company which had been held by Beckman and Gast went to Luke Beckman.

A variety of items have been canned here including red beets, carrots, pumpkin, dry beans, bean sprouts, turtle soup and Friday chili a chili made with turtle meat. Currently the plant packs whole tomatoes, stewed tomatoes, tomato juice and green beans, both cut and french-style. These vegetables are grown on company operated farms and by local growers.



Past presidents of the company include Luke Beckman, Lewis Gast, James Gast and William Gast. William Gast was the latest recipient of the H.D. Brown award for outstanding achievement in the food industry in Ohio and has served as President of the Ohio Food Processors Association as have James Gast and Luke Beckman. Robert Gast who served as the companies sales manager from the 1950's to 1981 was also instrumental in building the company to its current position. Present officers include Charles J. Bergman, president; William J. Gast, vice-president of agriculture: Nick Gast, vice-president of production, Osgood branch; Gerald Broering, vice-president of production, St. Henry; and Patricia L. Albers, secretary-treasurer. Most sales are arranged through brokers who make the direct contact with buyers for the large grocery store chains such as Kroger's, Marsh's or Cardinal Stores. Merchandise is labeled to customer specifications and shipped year round to points through out the mid-west, east coast and many southern states. The plant has continually expanded to its current size of approximately 56M feet. Full time employment is at about 15 with seasonal expansion bringing it up to nearly 150. Starting in 1985, all tomatoes were harvested with machines - Button-Johnson's. Beans are picked by a huge 4 row Pixall bean harvester. All of the plant engineering is done by company staff and much of the equipment used is also custom made. The plant is clean and employs all of the most modern methods for packing a product which enjoys an excellent reputation with its customers.

Mercer Beverage Company 221 North Walnut

Mercer Beverage Company was founded as the Fullenkamp Distributing Co. in 1930 by John Fullenkamp who acted as owner and General Manager. The company sold ice and soft drinks prior to the end of prohibition. John's four sons, Ray, Louis, Marinus "Tiny" and Alfred "Red", plus three other men worked at the business.

In 1930, 1931 and 1932 ice was retrieved from the old brewery pond just east of the Beckman and Gast Company. There was a long pulley and cable attached to the building; as John Heinrichs had his mules pull away from the building the ice was pulled off the pond onto a ramp. It was cut into large chunks and stored in the ice house and covered with sawdust and straw. As much as 250 tons a year were removed from the pond. The ice harvest generally employed 500 men and when the ice house was full the workers held a celebration.

The ice was peddled from door to door all summer. As the ice was delivered to area homes the delivery man would wash it under a pump and then put it in the ice box. Most ice boxes in the homes held 50 pounds and delivery was made twice a week.

In 1932 John Fullenkamp started buying artificially made ice from Minster, Ohio. The old pond was then used for fishing and swimming. As time progressed the pond became low on water and was abandoned. In the 1960's the pond was filled in by the Beckman and Gast Company who had purchased the land it was on some time before.

1933 saw John Fullenkamp move his business to its present location on Walnut Street. The site had previously been the home of Conover Creamery in the early 1900's. 1933 also saw Fullenkamp start selling beer. The company originally sold Wooden Shoe Beer from the Minster, Ohio brewery in Mercer and Auglaize counties. As business increased it became necessary to have more warehouse space so the present 50' x 100' cement block building was constructed in 1936. In later years another 50' x 100' metal building was added.

In 1938 the company had acquired distribution rights for Wagner Triple X, Pfeiffer, Wiedemann, Hudepohl, Budweiser and Carling Beers. Distribution was being done in Van Wert, Mercer, Darke and Auglaize counties. At this time beer was sold for \$1.25 per case and a good account might sell two cases a week. The draft beer as well as the bottled beer was in wooden cases and barrels and all were unloaded and loaded by hand. Often the wooden barrels would shrink and leak. One out of three was a leaker.

In 1946, John made it possible for his four sons, Ray, Louis, Tiny and Red to take over the business. The business was later incorporated as "Fullenkamp Distributing Co." As the years progressed Strohs Beer was acquired and became the principle brand. An event looked forward to each year was the St. Henry's St. Patrick Day Parade featuring green beer.

John Fullenkamp passed away in 1969 and the brothers ran the business until 1971 when it was sold to Tina Litchin and Florence Rouseff of Fort Wayne, Indiana.

November 1, 1971, Ralph Selby was appointed President and General Manager. At that time the brands handled were Strohs, Goebel, Wiedemann and Old German. In 1973 distribution rights for Blatz, Drewrys and Genesse were purchased from Wiatt Weaver, owner of Van Wert Distributing Co. The Van Wert business was closed and all operations were moved to St. Henry.

Later in 1973, Ace Wholesale Beverage Company in Sidney, Ohio was purchased from Harold and Richard Frierott. This gave the company Miller, Lite, Lowenbrau, Colt 45, Old Dutch and Meister Brau brands as well as distribution rights in Logan, Champaign and Shelby counties.

The acquisition of more brands and territory made it necessary to expand the warehouse five times to its now 30,000 square feet capacity. The present name was taken in 1973 after the purchase of the two other distributorships. Mercer Beverage Company in 1980 sold one million cases of beer and employed thirty-five people and had thirteen routes daily. Two employees Paul Niekamp and Cletus Beyke have been with Mercer Beverage Company since October 1, 1946.

Rutschilling, Inc. 331 Western

The Bimel Wheel and Spoke Factory, later known as the Bimel Handle Factory, began operations in 1899. The Bimel Company purchased the Moeder Brothers Sawmill in 1903. The Moeder Brothers were operating their sawmill as early as 1884. J.H. Hartings was the Manager of the Bimel Co. in 1907, and in 1910 Hartings purchased the sawmill. Hartings had the mill until his sons, Aloys and Urban, took over the mill operations in 1925.

Rutschilling Sawmill was founded in 1952 when Lawrence Rutschilling bought the sawmill from Aloys and Urban Hartings. In 1961, Leroy and his brother Wilbert took over the sawmill when their father retired. They then purchased the old Fox and Hess Mill building which had been standing empty for a number of years. The summer of 1962, they erected the present block and brick office building on the site. This contained the new lawnmower and chainsaw sales and service business they also operated. This part of the business was sold in 1981.

In 1961, they purchased the Builders Supply business from Linus Lammers, which they operated until 1969, when this part of the business was sold to the St. Henry Tile Co.

In 1966, the sawmill was completely destroyed by fire and was rebuilt and enlarged. The logs are bought from landowners in a radius of 50 miles from the mill. The mill produces grade lumber, pallet material, structural timber, dimensional lumber and lumber for general use by area farmers and land owners. The sawdust is used by the area farmers for bedding. In 1974, a chipper was installed and all slabs and waste are chipped and trucked to a roofing company where asphalt shingles are made. A larger chipper was installed in 1979 and more of the mill was automated.



In 1973 they purchased the Lammers Cement Specialty property east of the railroad. This is used for storage of logs and lumber. In 1975, Leroy purchased his brother's share of the business and in 1978 formed Rutschilling Inc. That same year, another large addition was added to the mill and additional new automated equipment was installed.

In 1981 the abandoned Penn Central railroad property east of the sawmill was purchased, giving them better loading and unloading facilities. The railroad tracks had been removed several years earlier.

In 1985, Kiln Dried lumber for hobbiest and furniture makers was added to the business. Also, a new by-product "Roywood" for natural campfires was introduced in 1986.

Rutschilling Sawmill started with 5 employees who did the logging as well as worked in the sawmill. In 1974, Ken Jacobs took over the loghauling end of the business and since then has hauled the logs on a subcontract basis to the mill after they are bought by a representative of the sawmill. The chips are also hauled on a subcontract basis with Romie Buening.

Today, Rutschilling Inc. employs 18 people which includes the sawmill and office personnel. Deliveries are made by a company truck in a 35 mile radius. Contract orders for shipping to all parts of the United States and Canada are picked up FOB at the sawmill.

The Saint Henry Bank 231 East Main

The St. Henry Bank was organized as a private bank in 1904 by J.H. Romer, Henry Romer, William H. Romer, John G. Romer and Edward F. Romer. In 1906, a two story building was erected and occupied until 1924. At that time, a new building was constructed and this building still serves its customers today.

The bank has always been noted to be a modern financial institution in southern Mercer County. In 1968, it became the first bank in the county to have computerized checking accounts. In 1975, a branch office was opened in Maria Stein, Ohio to serve its customers in that community.





Currently, the bank has total assets of 59 million dollars. Many changes over the years have affected how banking transactions are handled. Pen and pencils have been replaced by much high technology equipment. The bank has just completed installation of its own in-house NCR computer. All data processing is now done internally. Loans are no longer prepared manually, but typed on an IBM mini-computer.

In the last few years, a 3-lane drive-in was built to serve drive-up customers. These people are waited on while sitting in their automobiles parked 50 feet away from the bank. Their transactions are delivered to them through under-ground pneumatic tubes.

Also, an automatic teller machine (ATM) has been installed to allow a customer access to his accounts 24-hours a day. This is done through the use of a plastic card which has a customer's accounts encoded on it.

The directors of the bank are Don Evers, Albert Romer, Betty Romer, John Romer and Frank Woeste. Officers are John Romer-President, Donald Evers-Cashier, Frank Woeste-Loan Officer and Carl Hess-Maria Stein Manager.

Other employees include Kathy Fullenkamp, Mary Gagel, Diane Gremaux, Bonnie Heckman, Donna Hess, Esther Homan, Nancee Homan, Marlene Klose, Ginny Kremer, Thomas Kunk, Teresa Poling, Joyce Rindler, Diane Siegrist, Elaine Uhlenhake, Anita Wendel.

St. Henry Tile Company, Inc. 281 West Washington

The history of St. Henry Tile Co. goes back to the early 1900's when Mr. Herman Knapke bought the St. Henry Tile Co. from Mr. Ben Macke. The tile yard at that time was located on Washington Street just south of the canning factory Mr. Macke owned. In 1946 Linus Lammers bought the operation and ran it until 1960 when Al Homan, Robert Boeckman and Ray Kremer purchased it. In 1968 they purchased additional land and buildings south of the plant across Washington Street where the main office is now located.

Through the years the St. Henry Tile Co. has grown in production and size. In the early years concrete field tile, cement, gravel and coal were sold. In 1966 the operation was expanded to include ready mixed concrete and in the next 10 years building supplies, manufactured precast items and brick became part of the retail operation.

The St. Henry Tile Co., Inc. now includes the main plant in St. Henry, Ohio, a ready mix plant and building material operation in Berne, Indiana, a sand and gravel operation in Geneva, Indiana and a building material retail store in Celina, Ohio. These plants employ a total of 40 employees, with Al Homan, president; Louis J. Stahl, Gene Subler and Robert Homan as officers of the Corporation today.

St. Henry Lumber & Supply 131 East Main

After 17 years of operation, Ray and Mildred Wuebker closed St. Henry Laundry in May, 1980. At this time Tom and Vicki Wuebker revamped the building and installed an office and a showroom. This new business was named St. Henry Lumber & Supply. The building stands on Lot 58, a site originally occupied by the large building which housed Albert Gulde's clothing store, Ben Forstoefel's General Store and Uhlenhake's meat market. Ray Wuebker had the old building torn down in order to build the laundromat. While the laundry building was being redone there was a warehouse being built to store the lumber and building supplies. The warehouse was built behind Wuebker Pennzoil. A grand opening for St. Henry Lumber & Supply was held in July, 1980. St. Henry Lumber & Supply was open for business.

Throughout the succeeding years more and varied inventory was added. In May, 1983 a seamless gutter business was begun and installation of seamless guttering and downspouts was added to our line of inventory. The following May, Yorkshire Seamless Spouting was purchased which added another gutter machine and truck to the business.

St. Henry Lumber & Supply bought into a buying group, American Hardware Supply Co., Inc. in 1984. A membership in their Servistar program was obtained at the same time. With this membership periodic sales to the public were offered on all types of merchandise. St. Henry Lumber & Supply now carries a full line of lumber, building materials, windows, doors, hardware items and electrical supplies.

Tom's brother, Fred, joined the operation April 1, 1985. A partnership was formed which continues today.

Wuebker's Self-Service Pennzoil Station and Car Wash 121 East Main

In 1962, Ray and Mildred Wuebker purchased from the estate of J.L. Uhlenhake (a former J.L. Uhlenhake meat and grocery building) and decided to build a self-service laundry known as the St. Henry Laundry. The laundry was opened in August of 1963 and the present building was erected by R.E. Bruns Construction of Cranberry Prairie.

In 1965, Ray and Mildred bought the apartment building (now the site of their present home) from Jesse Schlegel to enlarge his parking area and built the present self-serve car wash (opened in 1965) which they still own and operate. The apartment building for many years was the home of the St. Henry Post Office.

In 1977, they decided to build their present home and service station so they proceeded in tearing down the apartment building. Tom Wuebker Construction (our son) built the home and self-serve station and it was opened in November, 1977. Presently we are living in the home and operate the station. We are an independently operated Pennzoil dealer and have a computerized Datacon read-out system in the office for our convenience. Our motto is "To Sell Gas For Less and We Try."

In May, 1981 we closed the laundry and sold the building to our son, Tom and he opened up a lumber and building supply operation now known as St. Henry Lumber & Supply. It is now owned by our son Tom, his wife, Vicki, and our son, Fred.

Ray and his wife, Mildred, raised five children and he was an assembly foreman at New Idea when he retired April 1, 1985 after 38 years of service. Also Ray was a real estate broker for 30 years prior to retiring December 31, 1985.



Gels I.G.A. Market 685 East Main

Jerry Gels and Ben Romer built the I.G.A. Supermarket in 1950. In 1950, R & G market was a Clover Farm Store, then in 1952, it was serviced by the White-Villa people and finally in 1957 the I.G.A. name was attached with their operation. Jerry Gels and Ben Romer remained partners between 1950 and 1958; Romer left in 1958 to go into the hardware business at 241 East Main. Gels continued in this supermarket business. In 1972, Charlie Gels, Jerry's son, took over the family operation of the store. Outside remodeling has changed the looks, but courteous service still continues. Fresh meats, produce, in-store delimade pizza and sandwiches, state liquor agency in an expanded carryout department are key and new features of the store. The year 1985 brought a reconditioned Main Street and in turn, added sidewalks to the east part of town.

Buehler's Meat Processing 131 South Sycamore

Buehler's Meat Processing, formerly called Gels Locker, was purchased from the Gels Brothers in 1980, by Jeff and Jill Buehler. They now do custom slaughtering, custom processing, have locker rentals, commercial cold storage, retail beef sides and quarters and retail cuts of frozen beef and pork.

They also sell a large volume of wholesale and retail ice. Buehler's Meat Processing also have carry-out beer and pop, cold cuts and canned beef.



Lefeld Pro Hardware 202 West Main

Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Lefeld have owned this business since 1959. The history of this building goes back to 1882, when William Lemm sold dry goods, groceries, boots, shoes and notions until 1892. J.J. Romer took over the business in 1893 and later accepted Mr. Feldhake as a partner. Eleven months later, after Mr. Feldhake's death, his widow sold her interest to Joseph Bruns. Five years later, they separated amicably and Mr. Romer remained in the Lefeld building until December 1, 1903, when he purchased the stock of John Henry Romer across from the church. About 1904, Anton Schuerman moved into the Lefeld building, after having bought the hardware business from Tumbusch and Gardner who had their hardware and implement business at the site of the Mobil Bulk Plant. Mr. Anton Schuerman died in 1916. Mrs. Anton Scheurman ran the store under the name of Mrs. A. Schuerman. Mr. Al Feldhake ran the store for his mother under the name of Schuerman Hardware. In 1949, Al Feldhake bought the store from his mother. A decade later, he sold the store to Ben and Agnes Lefeld, who have operated this business since then.

With a full-time work force of 7 people and an average seasonal employment of 12-15, B & L Construction strives to contribute to and serve the St. Henry Communty and surrounding area.

Gerald Bruns began distributing Pepsi Products from his garage at his home on Kremer-Hoying Road in September 1965. His wife, Ethel, is employed as secretary-bookkeeper of the corporation and his son Dan as a full time route salesman. Bruns purchases products through RKO Pepsi bottlers of Lima, Ohio and in turn distributes these throughout the area. The Community Hospital in Coldwater has modern equipment comparable to the hospitals in much bigger cities. Dr. Feliciano has seen a lot of improvements in the field of Medicine these past years. Dr. Feliciano succeeded Dr. Robert Slusher in 1970, who had served St. Henry for 34 years. Earlier St. Henry doctors were Dr. Schirack, Dr. J.J. In 1983, Dr. Feliciano opened an office in Celina, Wednesday and Friday afternoons 1:00-5:00; Saturday 10:00-1:00; and Monday, Tuesday and Thursday 5:00-7:00.

Gerlach Machine & Tool, Inc. 2629 State Route 118

The company first started in April of 1969 and was known as Gerlach Welding. It was started by Charles Gerlach on a part-time basis and operated from a garage behind the house. In October of 1973 the business was operated on a full-time basis. The name was changed to Gerlach Machine & Tool and still operated out of the garage. The company employed three full-time employees and one part-time employee. The company was doing tool work and designing and building special machinery for industry.

In 1976 business increased and more space was needed. In July a new steel building was constructed consisting of 3,500 square feet. The building was constructed on two acres of land purchased from a neighbor, Andrew Hemmelgarn. In November of 1979 a corporation was formed. Charles as President and Treasurer and Annrita, his wife, as Vice-President and Secretary. In October of 1980 the company took on a line of production machining. Gerlach Machine & Tool, Inc. now employs seven full-time employees and one part-time employee. The corporation does production machining for industry located in Van Wert, Columbus, Enon, Logan and Springfield, Ohio. Our peak season for production machining runs from March through October and 10,000 pieces are machined and shipped per day. Gerlach Machine & Tool, Inc. also has specially designed and built machinery located in California, Tennessee, Ohio, Oklahoma and the country of Norway.

Hogenkamp Funeral Home 221 East Main

Originally, the embalming and the viewing of the deceased was conducted at the home of the deceased. As time progressed the trend developed, due to better facilities and equipment and the convenience factor, among other advantages, the viewing and funeral services were conducted from the "Funeral Home."

The early history of the funeral home in St. Henry dates back to Fred Goettemoeller, who operated his business from the building that exists at 341 East Main Street. Mr. Goettemoeller sold the business to Henry Schmidt and after he operated it for a short while he sold the business to Harry and Harold Romer. The Romers moved the funeral business above the current St. Henry Hardware and Furniture store. In 1921, Stanley Romer became a partner in the business with Harry Romer. In the ensuing years Stanley Romer became sole owner and operator and moved the funeral business to its current location at 221 East Main Street.

N.J. Hogenkamp Sons Inc., purchased the funeral home on July 11, 1960 from Stanley Romer. Since 1960 the resident managers have been: N.P. Hogenkamp, 1960-1963; B. Jay Hogenkamp, 1963-1965; and Ed Garmann, 1965-1966. The current manager, Larry Heitkamp, began his employment at Hogenkamp's in 1966.



Jacobs & Sons Logging 132 North Sycamore

Kenneth and Marjorie Jacobs began Jacobs & Sons Logging August, 1972. Before Ken started his own business, he was employed at Rutschilling Sawmill since December 5, 1957.

Jacobs & Sons Logging cuts, skids and hauls logs to various sawmills. The area covered for logging has expanded from Mercer County to a 100 mile radius.

In 1986, in addition to Ken, they employ their three sons (Tim, Mark and Jerry) and Ron Rutschilling.

The equipment used to process the logs are two John Deere grapple skidders, a W14 Case loader and a 120 Prentice Knuckleboom loader. The logs are hauled in on two Semi Tractor Trailers.

Mercer Landmark Inc. 281 West Main

The Farmers Grain and Milling Company built their elevator in 1910. It was later known as the Landman Milling Co., and the United Grain and Milling Co. Circa 1939, they installed a new scale and built a new two story warehouse to handle their increasing business. Landmark purchased the elevator from United Grain and Milling Co. in December 1957. Equally historical was the old elevator which was built by Fox and Hess in 1901; Joe Davis was in charge of this elevator. Fox and Hess were the sole owners of that mill until its sale to Landmark about 1947 or 1948. It was operated until 1958 when it was torn down. The Fox and Hess building stood at the site of Rutschilling Sawmill.

The present elevator made bran, midds and bagged Silverleaf Flour until 1951. The equipment was run by steam engine power. In 1958 United Grain Co. sold the present elevator to Mercer Landmark. In 1961, a fertilizer warehouse was built for bagged facility and then was converted to a bulk warehouse and blend plant in early 1967. A seventythousand bushel grain storage and grain dryer were added in the early 1970's. In 1986, a 50 ton bulk feed storage was added and the office and store area was remodeled. Landmark offers complete feed service, fertilizer, chemicals, seed, animal health products and livestock equipment, to name only a few items. Landmark employs six people at the St. Henry Elevator.





Mercer Oil, Inc. Railroad & Center Streets

Formerly known as the Mobil Oil Co., Mercer Oil, Inc. came into existence in November of 1980. It was at this time, Mobil wanted to sell all of its bulk plants. They were to be sold and become a distributor of Mobil Oil Corporation.

The original petroleum hauler in St. Henry was John Gels. When Mobil bought him out, Isadore Droesch was the first driver for them. Norb Dippold recalled having five or six large bulk tanks in 1941. At present, there are nine tanks plus a warehouse for oils, lubes and greases at the location.

When Bill Reiling began his employment with Mobil, he had a 550 gallon truck. His truck was unloaded with funnels and buckets and usually put into 55 gallon drums. Today, Walt Fortkamp uses an eighteen hundred gallon tank truck and pumps off three loads on any given busy day. Through the years, Bill Dues and Harold "Whitey" Thobe have also been associated with Mobil.

The office is now located at 342 Center Street, being moved from the old Mobil building at 331 West Main. In November of 1980, Phillip Martin and his associates purchased the bulk plant from Mobil. In April of 1983, the bulk plant was purchased by Walt (Doc) and Thelma Fortkamp. Besides delivery by the small tank truck in predominantly the southern part of Mercer County, delivery can also be made by a semi load delivery of 8800 gallon of gas or 7600 gallon of diesel of #2 fuel oil.

The Messenger Press

The Messenger Press, owned and operated by the Society of the Precious Blood, is a printing establishment which began at St. Joseph's College in Rensselaer, Indiana in the early 1900's. It was moved to Mercer County at Carthagena, Ohio in 1922, and set up in the south basement at St. Charles Seminary. The "Messenger of the Precious Blood" and a similar magazine, "Der Botschafter", were the main publications at that time. Since the early years the Messenger Press has always done commercial printing for churches and business establishments in the area and as far away as Dayton. The editors, typesetters and printers were Precious Blood Priests and Brothers.

As time went on and the business grew, laymen were hired to help with typesetting and press work. In 1961, the printing operation was moved to its present location directly behind the main building of St. Charles Seminary.

Over the years changes were made to accommodate modern printing methods. At the present time the Messenger Press meets the demands of its customers from all over the country with a complete line of business forms, computer forms, stationery, business cards, office supplies, wedding accessories and other printing needs. The Messenger Press is proud to be listed as one of the oldest printing establishments in Mercer County.

Osterholt Sales & Service Inc. 644 East Main

Howard Osterholt began his business on July 1, 1948 as a garage and a body shop at 151 South Sycamore Street. In 1953 Osterholt acquired the franchise for Rambler cars, later known as American Motors. In 1967 he moved his business to 652 East Main Street, where he continued until 1986 when Dan Osterholt, his son, who had been employed in the body shop, took over the body shop which continues in the building. Mr. Osterholt built a new office at 644 East Main and continues with the late model used cars sales.

The Movie Shoppe 642 East Main

Howard and Betty Osterholt opened The Movie Shoppe in February, 1986. They have a large selection of VHS movie tapes to rent out.

Osterholt Trailer Park

The Osterholts opened the Osterholt Trailer Park in the spring of 1974 and have space for six mobile homes.

Osterholt Body Shop

Osterholt Body Shop was originally part of Osterholt Sales and Service, Inc. In 1986 Dan Osterholt began ownership of the Body Shop and continues to do body work and paint work.

Romer-Knueve Pharmacy 255 East Main


Romer Store owned and operated by Stanley Romer from 1923 to 1971 and Mrs. Stanley (Loretta) Romer from 1971 to present changed its name on May 14, 1979 to Romer-Knueve Pharmacy. At this time a full line prescription service was added to the store by Charles and Margaret (Kinkley) Knueve, granddaughter of Stanley and Loretta Romer. The store also has health and beauty aids, greeting cards, jewelry, film and processing, assorted gifts, school supplies, religious articles, candy, soda fountain and the Ohio lottery.

In addition to Loretta and Chuck owning and operating each of their businesses, the store also employs Lucille Stahl, Margaret Rinderle, Linda Kunk, Jill Romer another granddaughter of Stanley and Loretta Romer, and several relief pharmacists.

In 1940 Stanley Romer replaced the original wood-lapsided log cabin structure with the present brick building. The older picture is from the interior of the original structure; the newer from the present building. By comparing the two pictures one can see that the interior of the buildings are structurally similar. The dramatic changes are evident in the volume of merchandise and the methods of displaying this merchandise.

J.J. Romer Clothing 314 East Main

Joseph J. and Patricia (Hoelscher) Romer purchased Buschor Department Store on July 1, 1976 from Louis and Verna Buschor. This business has been operated by families who are descendants of the earliest businessmen in St. Henry.

J.H. Romer, who originally operated the store on the east side of the present location of St. Henry Hardware & Furniture, 279 East Main, from 1867-1903. He sold his business to his nephew Joseph J. Romer, who is the present owner's grandfather, on May 25, 1907. St. Henry Advocate advertised J.J. Romer's General Store as carrying an immense stock of dry goods, clothing, furnishings, shoes, hats and caps — everything that went to make a general store. After J.J. Romer's death, Harry, Harold and Stanley Romer sold the business to Beckman & Gast, who had a retail grocery and dry goods business at this site between 1923 and 1927. Harry Romer then purchased the store and operated it till his two sons purchased the store from him. Harry Romer Jr. bought the dry goods side on the west side of the building. Lowell bought the grocery side on the east side. In 1949 Mr. and Mrs. Louis Buschor purchased the business from her brother Harry Romer Jr.

Joseph J. Romer moved the store to the location that previously was St. Henry Furniture, 341 East Main, on February 23, 1983. In April of 1986, he moved his location across the street to 314 East Main, into the building owned by Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Tumbusch.

J.J.'s Cutting Edge 314 East Main

The Barber Shop was opened on February 1, 1986 by Joseph J. Romer. J.J.'s Cutting Edge is located in the same building as the new J.J. Romer Clothing Store.

Ron's Service 301 West Main

Ron and Jane Moeller bought the service station business from Nip Wehrkamp in April 1970. At that time Mobil Oil Company owned the building and also occupied the back part of the building for its office for the bulk plant. The building was purchased by the Moellers from Mobil Oil Company in September 1975. This enabled the business to be expanded through the years from a two bay service station to a four bay garage operation. Currently employed as full time mechanics are Bill Dysert, Jr. and Bruce Dysert.

Charles "Tubbie" Schrage had the station from 1937 to 1957; Oscar Borgerding and Alvin "Squeak" Uhlenhake were his employees; Schrage sold out to Wehrkamp in 1957. This building was not always a garage. Mrs. Jacob Bany built this building in 1910. On the south side of the building, there were three places of business. Wallpaper was sold on the west side; pianos were sold in the center; an ice cream parlor was managed on the east side. Harry Romer had a dry goods business in this building in the 1920's. Other businesses, e.g. a grocery store, were also housed in this building. Dances and programs were held on the second floor of the building.

St. Henry Hardware & Furniture 279 East Main

Larry and Pat Balster own and operate St. Henry Hardware and Furniture. The west building was built by J.H. Romer in 1889; then in 1903, sold to J.J. Romer, who had a general store. In 1906, the east side was erected and occupied by the St. Henry Bank until 1924. After J.J. Romer's death, Harry, Harold and Stanley Romer sold this business to Beckman and Gast about 1923. In 1927 Harry Romer bought out Beckman and Gast. Harry ran the store until his sons, Harry, Jr. bought the dry goods side on the west and Lowell Romer bought the grocery side on the east. Jake Buschor bought the dry goods side from Harry Jr., a few years later. In 1975 J.J. Romer bought the dry goods business from Jake Buschor and in 1982 moved the dry goods business to 341 East Main. Lowell sold the grocery side to Wm. Lichtle who then closed the business around 1962. Carl Kohn opened a grocery for a year or so. In 1965 Ben Romer moved the St. Henry Hardware to the east side, and in 1973, he sold the hardware business to Larry and Pat Balster. In 1981 Ken Coffield, 341 East Main, sold the St. Henry Furniture to Larry and Pat Balster, who, in 1982, moved the St. Henry Furniture to the west side of the building at 279 East Main.

Even having three owners, each holding another full-time job, the Nite Club keeps one full-time employee and 4-5 part-time employees.

Schockman Lumber Company 342 West Columbus

The P. Kuntz and Herr Lumber Company was incorporated in 1896. By 1907, they had built three large buildings and an office building. As time passed. Jos. Moeller and Herr were in partnership, then Moeller bought Herr's share. January 1, 1944, Louis, Clarence and Carl Schockman bought the lumber company from Joe Moeller and Henry Fiely. Clarence was the manager from 1944 until 1956; Louis was then the manager until 1970. Al Romer was manager from 1970 until he and his wife Ruth purchased Schockman Lumber Company in January 1977, and have continued this ownership to date.

About 1949, the company acquired the old poultry building from Morsey, and in 1953, 1960 and 1965 they erected more buildings for storage. They began their kitchen supply business in 1963. The greatest innovation came in 1967 when they got their hydraulic lift truck — they had a smaller one in 1965 — but they had previously had to unload everything by hand.

Today, 1986, the Romers have kept the name Schockman Lumber Company and have continued the operation. They have four trucks and two fork trucks. They furnish materials for houses, farm buildings and a multitude of kinds of buildings. They have seven and one-half employees providing good service to the public.

H. R. Stachler Construction is owned and operated by Homer Stachler and located at 4949 Lange Road. He started construction work with his father in 1960, known then as Ray Stachler Construction. He worked for him until he retired. Then along with his brothers Myron of Chickasaw and Roger of St. Henry they became Stachler Brothers Construction. In 1976, he decided to go into business for himself. They work mostly with farm buildings and poultry buildings, but also do homes and remodeling. In 1986, he started his own cement crew for putting in house basements and foundations for other buildings using aluminum forms. The work force varies with the work load. During the summer months they employ as many as twenty-five men. During the winter this number is down to ten.





Roger L. Stachler Construction, Inc. 1766 State Route 118

Roger L. Stachler Construction, Inc. has been in business since January 1, 1980.

Roger's corporation is really quite young, but there are many years of construction experience.

Roger is the oldest son of Ray Stachler, Ray was and still is quite a craftsman. Roger started going to work with his dad back in the midforties. They built anything in those days with few power tools. Ray and his crew built barns, houses and did lots of remodel work.

Their office is located at 2735 State Route 118 in St. Henry, Ohio.





On May 1, 1956, at the age of eighteen, Tom Osterholt, along with his father, Norbert, leased the present Osterholt Sohio Service Station Inc. from Ferd Rengers. 


R & R Fabrications, Inc.



Saint Henry Catholic Church Parish

St. Henry Church in the year 1986 finds itself, along with the Catholic church as a whole, in the process of growth begun with the Second Vatican Council. It is not unlike the growth process of an infant into adolescence. Before the Council the church might be compared to infancy. At that time the Pastor made all the decisions, made the rules and cared for his people along with an assistant. The people had a passive role and were expected to be obedient to authority. They had very little to say about what went on in the parish and still less in its worship life. They looked upon the priest as a dispenser of grace in the same way that a parent feeds its child and cares for him.

Today, we find the church in a teenage stage of development. The Priest, now as parent, has the role of encouraging his people to accept their responsibilities to God, neighbor, and self. Many of the things that the priest did for his people are now being done by the people themselves. The movement was made from a passive church to an active involved laity.

As a consequence, we now have Parish Councils that, with the pastor, determine the directions that the parish will take, on all levels of its life. We have Commissions of that Council to handle areas of Liturgy, Finance, Mission, Education etc. Married couples are in charge of marriage preparation courses. Lay committees now care for the needy of the parish and also welcome new members into the parish community of St. Henry.

With the advent of the Harvest Project in the diocese, the parish is now in dialogue with other parishes to establish cooperation on programs of concern. Already in process is the combined Catechetical Program and Inter-Parish Youth Group. Each program is run by a lay board, composed by members of each parish. In the process is the development of a Baptismal program which is being assembled by a lay man. Planned for the near future is the re-establishment of the Adult Education committee. Hopefully this will be an Inter-Parish endeavor.

Also reflecting the change of the parish is the renovation of the Church's physical look. St. Henry's Church now reflects the new liturgy and presents, for the people's worshipping life, a functional church where liturgy can be carried out by God's family. The altar becomes central to the assembly. Uncluttered by statues and paintings, the people's attention is now centered on the pulpit where they hear the Word of God and the altar where they offer as a priestly people, the sacrifice of Jesus. No longer passive spectators at the Eucharist, they now, with their priest, offer through song and word, fitting praise to God, Our Father. Today as never before they receive the gift of life, the Eucharist in great numbers and even partake of the cup of salvation.

Perhaps what is happening in the liturgical life of the parish best exemplifies the new life of the church. Before the Council the people

had a posture of passivity. They did not participate, but prayed their prayers and said their rosaries. All the liturgical activities were left up to the priest, servers and organist. Today the people are once again called upon to take up their part in the worshipping life of the church. The people now sing and pray in their own language. They carry out certain functions in the liturgy as Communion distributors, lectors, leaders of song, ushers etc. The liturgy is their responsibility and its beauty rests on how they carry out their roles.

The transition into responsible Christian adults has not been easy. The people find themselves in the same insecure position as a teen. There are those who want things to stay the same and do not want to grow but remain children. There are others accepting the challenge, and with unsteady steps, are making the transition into Christian adulthood. And there are those who have made the transition in glorious fashion and are moving ahead with conviction and pride.

As parent, Father is finding his new role difficult as well. Like any parent, he struggles with the growing child, facing the adolescent rebellion and search for maturity. He looks now for his own changing role as priest — as pastor. The pastor today has a different role to play. He is no longer the sole director of the family with the absolute authority. Now he stands as listener, encourager, and supporter of the people's growth process. If he is insecure, it is for much the same reasons that any parent of adolescents is insecure. He no longer has the control that he once had over his children and he feels less needed than he once did. Like any parent, he fears that his children will make mistakes which could hurt them and cause them pain. He loves them as any parent and wants only the best for them.

Much has yet to be done to achieve the Vatican Council's directive, namely, that we become a Community of God's people — a family gathered under his fatherhood. Perhaps, as each person grows to maturity in Christ, we will begin to realize that goal of the Council. Then, in church we will not be just a gathering of individuals, but a family gathered together in Jesus' name.

Through all the challenges, heartaches and struggles, the life of the church in St. Henry is exciting as its grows to maturity in the Lord. As we love and support one another, we take pride in our growth, and enjoy each other as the family of God.

Saint Henry Catholic Church

John DeCurtins was awarded the contract for building the new church, the summer of 1894. His father, Anthony DeCurtins, had built the previous St. Henry Church, of brick, in 1854. (That building was torn down in 1901.) A. Druiding, Chicago, was the architect. The Laying of the Cornerstone Ceremony was held June 16, 1895. Herman Brockmann, a German sculptor, worked in 1896, in Saint Henry Village, as he sculpted the Statue of Saint Henry, which is over eight feet tall.

Saint Henry Catholic Church was dedicated Sunday, July 25, 1897. The magnificent example of Gothic architecture, was built in the form of a Latin cross. It was built of brick, ornamented with blue Bedford stone, and had an entire length of 163 feet. The width of the church proper was 66 feet and the transept was 86 feet. The height of the tall, graceful tower was 200 feet. Ten stone columns 19 inches in diameter, supported the arched ceiling, the center nave of which was 52 feet above the level of the floor. The church had an approximate seating capacity of 1200. (Source: Catholic Telegraph, July 29, 1897; Celina Democrat, July 29, 1897, and Der Mercer County Bote, May 9, 1895, June 23, 1896, and July 29, 1897, the German newspaper being translated by Rev. Dominic Gerlach, C.PP.S. and transcribed by Joyce Alig.)



Saint Henry Catechetical Center

The St. Henry Catechetical Center was opened in 1964 to provide the parents of the St. Henry School District with a released-time program for the instruction of their children in the Catholic faith. The Center was built under the direction of Fr. Max Herber, C.PP.S., then pastor of St. Henry parish, and it has been operated by a board composed of members from St. Aloysius (Carthagena), St. Bernard (Burkettsville), St. Francis (Cranberry), St. Henry and St. Wendelin parishes and their respective pastors.

Over the years the faculty has included priests of the Society of the Precious Blood, Sisters of St. Francis (Hartwell), Sisters of the Precious Blood and many lay teachers. At the present time approximately nine hundred and fifty students, Kindergarten through grade twelve, are enrolled in this program and attend classes twice a week. Instruction includes Sacrament Preparation, Basic Doctrine, Scripture, Church History and Morality.

Pastors are: Rev. Cornelius Fenton, C.PP.S. (St. Aloysius), Rev. Werner Verhoff, C.PP.S. (St. Bernard), Rev. Arnold Meiring, C.PP.S. (St. Francis), Rev. Raymond Bauer, C.PP.S. (St. Henry) and Rev. Robert Reinhart, C.PP.S. (St. Wendelin).

Board members are: Carson Cheek, St. Aloysius; Donald Ontrop and Kathleen Naseman, St. Bernard; Patricia Watercutter, St. Francis; William Glass, Richard Schmackers and Esther Beyke, St. Henry; and Kathleen Brunswick, St. Wendelin.

The original section of the St. Henry High School located at 181 South Walnut Street was constructed in 1939. Several additions have been added, one being in 1954 and another in 1965 which included expansion of the present gymnasium.

The High School is composed of grades 9 thru 12. There are a total of 338 students in attendance during the 1986-1987 year. (9th-84, 10th-75, 11th-90, 12th-89)

During the 1985-1986 school year St. Henry became a member of the Tri-Star Vocational Compact. (Celina, St. Marys, Coldwater, Marion Local, Minster, New Bremen, New Knoxville, Southwest Local, St. Henry). During the 1986-1987 school year 28 students are traveling to vocational classes at other Tri-Star sites.

St. Henry High School

Twenty students from Marion and Southwest Local are attending classes at St. Henry (Junior I.O.E., Agriculture)

Students may choose from a regular or vocational curriculum. Students may enroll in vocational courses both at Tri-Star of their home school. A student is required to pass 19 units of credit for graduation. (English, Language Arts — 3 units, Physical Education — $\frac{1}{2}$ unit, Science — 1 unit, Social Studies — 2 units, Mathematics — 2 units, Health — $\frac{1}{2}$ unit, Electives — 10 units.

St. Henry High School was granted full accreditation to the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools in March of 1986. As a part of the requirements for membership in the Association, a comprehensive evaluation of programs and services of the school was conducted in November — 1985. This evaluation consisted of a self-study, team review, and formulation and implementation of a school improvement plan.

The school day is composed of 7 teaching periods of approximately 52 minutes in length. The professional staff consists of the following: 24 shared and full time teachers, a principal, a guidance counselor, a librarian, shared county personnel — supervisors and pupil services, a secretary, and a custodian.

Student participation in extra-curricular activities is an important part of the total educational program. Clubs/Organizations: German Club, Spanish Club, Math-Science Club, Future Homemakers of America, Future Teachers of America, Industrial Arts Club, Art Club, Office Education Association, Future Farmers of America, Band, Pep Band, Chorus, Yearbook, Student Council, National Honor Society. Athletics: Football, Golf, Boys and Girls Cross Country, Volleyball, Boys and Girls Basketball, Baseball, Boys and Girls Track. The athletic program has been very successful over the years with State Championships coming in 1979 — Boys Basketball, 1979 — State Discus, and 1985 — Girls Volleyball.

Yearly activities consist of a Homecoming Dance, Sweethearts Dance, and Jr.-Sr. Prom. The Annual Awards Program (1985-1986) is a three part program consisting of the following: National Honor Society Induction, Academic Honor Award Recognition, and Student Service Award Recognition.

St. Henry Middle School

The construction of the St. Henry Middle School was completed in 1980. It is located at 381 East Columbus Street. It contains twelve regular classrooms, and a science laboratory. It also contains a large gymnasium which seats 2000 people, a media center, a music department, and an art department which are shared with the high school students.

The Middle School houses 240 6th, 7th, and 8th grade students and is staffed by 17 full and part-time teachers, a principal, a counselor, and a media center director. It is also staffed by one secretary, a media center aide and a full and part-time custodian.

Its curriculum consists of Reading, English, Mathematics, Social Studies, Science, Computer Literacy, Music, Art, Health and Physical Education. There is also special instruction for pupils with learning disabilities.

St. Henry Middle School was granted full accreditation to the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools in March of 1986. A comprehensive evaluation of the programs and services of the school was conducted in November of 1985. This evaluation consisted of a selfstudy, team review, and formulation and implementation of a school improvement program.

The Middle School also has an extra-curricular program which includes band, choir, girls volleyball, girls basketball, girls track, boys football, boys basketball, and boys track.

Burkettsville Elementary

The present Burkettsville Elementary Building which is located on Main Street in Burkettsville, Ohio was constructed in 1939. An addition to that building was added in 1958. Burkettsville became a part of the St. Henry Local School District in July of 1959. Cranberry was annexed to the St. Henry Local School District at the same time, although the building remained open until the end of the 1960-61 school year. Wendelin was annexed to St. Henry on January 1, 1958, with the building remaining open the remainder of that school year. On December 23, 1959 the St. Henry Local School District and the Carthagena Local School District consolidated to become the St. Henry Consolidated Local School District. The Carthagena Building remained open until the end of the 1960-61 school year.

There are a total of 162 students in the Burkettsville Elementary Building in the 1986-1987 school year. There are 87 Fourth Grade students in three classes and 75 Fifth Grade students in three classes. Staffing the Burkettsville Building are 6 regular classroom teachers, teaching the basic subjects of: Reading, English, Mathematics, Writing, Science, Social Studies, and Health. There are 4 additional teachers teaching in the special areas of: Music, Art, Learning Disabilities, and Physical Education. Also working with the students is a part-time guidance counselor who is shared with the Middle and Elementary Buildings and a part-time librarian who also helps with some of the secretarial duties.

The Burkettsville Elementary has its own cafeteria which is operated by one full time cook and one server to help serve the food. Two part-time custodians are employed to clean the building.

St. Henry Elementary School

The present St. Henry Elementary School which is located at 192 South Walnut Street was constructed in 1961. There is a total of 310 students in the Elementary Building in the 1986-1987 school year. There are 80 Kindergarten students in three classes, 79 First Grade students in three classes, 62 Second Grade students in three classes, and 89 Third Grade students in four classes.

The Elementary is staffed with 12 regular classroom teachers, teaching the basic subjects of: Reading, Mathematics, English, Writing, Science, Health, and Social Studies. There are 5 additional teachers teaching in the special areas of Music, Art, Remedial Reading, Learning Disabilities, and Physical Education. Also staffing the Elementary is a principal, a part-time guidance counselor who is shared with the Middle and Burkettsville Buildings, a secretary, a part-time librarian, and two part-time custodians.

The Elementary Building is used at lunch time for all students from the High School, Middle School, and the Elementary Buildings. To operate the cafeteria there are two full time cooks and five additional servers to help serve the food.

The Elementary as well as the Burkettsville Building will be going through North Central Accreditation during the 1986-1987 school year. The self-study part of the evaluation has been completed, with the team visit and school improvement plan to still occur.



St. Henry Education Association

The St. Henry Education Association was established to promote the interests of education; and to secure the conditions necessary to promote the greatest efficiency of the teacher, the administrator and the school. Its members are teachers in the St. Henry Consolidated Local School System and are affiliated with Western Ohio Education Association, Ohio Education Association and National Education Association. The St. Henry Education Association has established a scholarship fund and annually conducts several fund raisers towards the accumulation of scholarship money. A scholarship is given to a senior each year, and numerous smaller scholarships are awarded to students attending summer learning experiences. The St. Henry Education Association also promotes National Teacher Day, American Education Week and in 1985 held a "Back to School Day," in which local persons were invited into the school to be a teacher for a day. Saint Henry Basketball Coach Fran Guilbault recorded his 400th Coaching Victory, in his 26th season, Saturday night, December 27, 1986, when the 1986 Redskin Team won a 61-56 decision over the Kalida Wildcats. The Saint Henry Board of Education had hired Fran Guilbault as their seventh basketball coach for the 1961-1962 season. Guilbault has been named to the Ohio High School Basketball Coaches Hall of Fame, in addition to numerous other awards.

Saint Henry has been enthusiastic about sports. Sports' fans remember long term coaches Julius Moeder, 1923-1934, and Charles Karcher, 1938-1952. Sports' fans need only read the family histories in this book to see the families with children participating in the high school athletic programs.

St. Henry Athletic Boosters

The St. Henry Athletic Boosters were formed by the St. Henry High School Athletic Department in late 1979. The Athletic Director called a meeting inviting community leaders and people interested in the St. Henry sports programs. After several organizational meetings, the St. Henry Athletic Boosters were founded.

The first meeting of the Booster Club was held March 3, 1980. Dave Puthoff was the President of this new club. The first project of the Booster Club was to build a building at the football stadium. This building would have a concession stand, storage area and locker rooms. A month long fund raising drive was organized to finance the building. The goal of the fund drive was to raise \$30,000. Volunteer solicitors made personal contacts and the drive exceeded its goal. The building was built and a fence erected around the parking lot and football field. This football and baseball area would later be called "Wally Post Athletic Complex" in memory of St. Henry High School's well known major league baseball player.

In November of 1980, the Booster Club was asked by the St. Henry Board of Education to help construct the bleachers in the Middle School Gymnasium. Eager to help, the Booster Club supplied many volunteers to construct these bleachers which saved the Board of Education money and made the new Gymnasium ready for its first game.

These types of projects have been numerous in the few years the Booster Club has been organized. The Club has bought hurdles for the track team, purchased a scoreboard for the baseball field, landscaped the Athletic Complex and helped in many other ways. The funds for expenses are raised primarily with a membership drive, stand at the picnic, chicken fry at a football scrimmage, "125" dance and concessions at all home sporting events. The Booster Club members are asked to help at these fund raisers. The past Presidents of the Club were Dave Puthoff, Bill Gast Jr., Walt Fortkamp, John Moeller, Vic Post, Roger Rindler and John Dippold. The help of the Executive boards and the general memberships have made their jobs easier.

The latest major project of the Club began in November 1984. A weight training room was added to the building at the "Wally Post Athletic Complex." In order to complete this weight room, large debts were incurred. However, the St. Henry Booster Club will continue to have their fund raisers to reduce their debts. Our major objective is to help St. Henry High School Athletics. Helping the St. Henry Athletes and St. Henry Coaches will always be our primary goal.

The St. Henry Community Band Boosters was founded in the early 1950's by Louis Schockman, Luke Burger and Norb Dippold as a support group for the band. The first officers were Lucille Schockman, Marie Schwieterman and Irene Moorman. The Boosters (originally the Band Mothers) bascially support the school band financially above and beyond what the school board budget allows. It also supports the band morally with activities like swimming parties, skating parties and more recently with band banquets and trips to Cedar Point.

Major money raisers over the years used to purchase uniforms (the last time in 1981 for \$14,000), major instruments, etc. have included bingo (1966-1985) and for over 25 years the grocery stand at the Community Picnic. On Tag Day (discontinued in 1981), band members canvassed the town asking for donations in exchange for a Band Booster tag. Sock hops after basketball games provided a social event for the teenagers in the 1960's as well as a fund raiser for the band. Uniform rent was also used to raise money.

Other money raising activities have included selling Christmas cards (until 1969), dances, candy, soap, pecans, pizza and submarine sandwich sales, a special uniform fund drive in 1962, a community birthday calendar, card parties, raffle of a Lawrence Sonderman painting, the sale of cheese logs, cheese spread and summer sausage, the showing of the movie "Stars and Stripes Forever" (1963) — adults 50¢ and children 25¢ and Irish Day Parade sandwich stand. Sales tax stamps, Teem bottle cap seals, "cents-off" coupons, Beatrice Foods products' labels and lid, inner seals from Maxim coffee, Betty Crocker coupons, and grocery cash register tapes from area stores were saved and redeemed for income.

As of 1986 the Band Boosters rely mainly on the sale of pizza, submarine and pecans and the grocery stand to help finance the band.



Granville Township Library Promoters

The Granville Township Library Promoters originally formed with the purpose of initiating a library in the Village of St. Henry, to serve the citizens of Granville Township, Mercer County, Ohio. The idea of a library had grown over the years. Since the founding of the village in 1837, the citizens had erected schools and encouraged education. Local citizens had worked providing library services to the public, e.g., Bob Miller and Ken Coffield. When the Jaycees began, they took a written survey of citizens' needs and the library was identified as needed.

In the autumn of 1974, Louis Huelsman contacted Emily Osterholt, Joyce Alig, John Romer and William Gast about establishing a library. January 17, 1975, these five citizens signed a letter to the Mercer County District Library Trustees requesting establishment of a branch library. March 5, 1975, they met with these Trustees, who suggested they organize, elect officers and initiate a 'friends of the library' organization. Following that meeting, the committee held election of officers: Joyce Alig, President; Myron Huelsman, Vice-President; Emily Osterholt, Secretary: Louis Huelsman, John Romer and William Gast, Trustees. They contacted representatives of organizations and held the first community meeting, April 1, with 41 people present who chose the name GRANVILLE TOWNSHIP BRANCH LIBRARY PROMOTERS. They then followed with a community survey with 780 surveys mailed, with 444 returned representing 1,046 adults and 1,076 children. The survev was a success with very positive community support for a library in Granville Township.

April 8, 1975, the Granville Township Trustees, Vic Boeke, John Balster and Mark Kremer, adopted Resolution #101, permitting Granville Township Branch Library the use of the Granville Township House. At the April 29, 1975 meeting of the Granville Township Library Promoters, the members requested that the Granville Township Library Promoters' Founding Committee Officers remain in office for 1975, for continuity for the establishment of the Branch Library, until the next annual election in January 1976. Therefore, this committee continued their work with the Mercer County Commissioners, the Mercer County Budget Commission and the Mercer County District Li-

brary Board of Trustees and the Citizens of Granville Township. The 1975 Officers were President Joyce Alig, Vice-President Myron Huelsman, Secretary Emily Osterholt and Trustees Louis Huelsman, John Romer and William Gast. At the April 1975 meeting, there were 228 paid members of the Library Promoters. The Mercer County District Library Board of Trustees passed Resolution #1, April 29, 1975, stating that if St. Henry Community would provide a suitable site, the Board would seek additional funds for staffing and providing books from the Mercer County Budget Committee. July 1, 1975, the Promoters' Officers met with the Mercer County Commissioners, who stated they would be happy to give Revenue Sharing funds for a Library Building, but it was not legal to do so. However, this was changed August 29, 1975, when Ohio Governor James Rhodes signed Amended Senate Bill No. 257, which became effective November 28, 1975, which made it possible for Libraries to receive Federal Revenue Sharing.

Officers for the Promoters were elected February 17, 1976: President Ralph Huelsman; Vice President Ralph Ording; Secretary Molinda Miller; Treasurer Mrs. Carl Hoying; Membership Chairperson Dorothy Koenig. The Promoters approved a monthly meeting date of the first Thursday of the month. At the April 1 meeting, reports were given by Secretary Molinda Miller and Pat Post gave the Treasurer's report. Jim Lammers gave his report for the Bicentennial plans; St. Henry being a Bicentennial Community in recognition of the Bicentennial of the United States, 1776-1976.

At the March 4 meeting, the Fourth of July, 1976, had been determined as the date of dedication ceremonies for the Granville Township Branch of the Mercer County District Library. Also the Granville Township Branch Library Promoters' Constitution and By-laws were approved, at that March 4, 1976 meeting. The Mercer County District Library Board of Trustees met with the Mercer County Budget Commission July 14, 1976, and attended the Mercer County Budget Hearing August 28, and requested \$5,000 for the Granville Township Branch Library of the Mercer County District Library. Everyone in Granville Township was proud to see the Dedication of this Granville Township Branch Library on July 4, 1976. This was the culmination of not only two years' work by local citizens, but also decades of dedication to learning and high standards of education by the entire township, from the earliest settlers in 1836-37, through Bicentennial Celebration on the Fourth of July 1976. Ruth Laux was the first Librarian of this newly estabished Granville Township Branch Library.

The Mercer County Commissioners attended the January 13, 1977 meeting of the Promoters and reported their promise to give \$10,000 to both Granville Township and Mendon Branch Libraries for four years. Mercer County Commissioners Record, Resolution #49, page 346, was February 4, 1977. The County Auditor's Certificate for this \$10,000 was

approved February 17, 1977, Purchase Order Z-1 D, Certificate No. 2. The next \$10,000 came with Commissioners' Resolution #72, page 128, February 10, 1978. Only one meeting of Granville Township Library Promoters was held in 1978, with five members present. The next \$10,000 from Revenue Sharing Funds from the Commissioners, came with Resolution #104A, page 547, March 2, 1979. One meeting of the Granville Township Library Promoters was held May 2, 1979. The Mercer County Commissioners appointed Ralph Ording in 1979 as Trustee to Mercer County District Library. The fourth of the series of Revenue Sharing Funds were awarded, Resolution #941, page 347, February 8, 1980.

Three meetings were held in 1980. At the January meeting, Bea Lammers presented the Librarian's Report that the 1979 circulation figure was 16,045. In 1979, the Library received \$920 adult books and \$1,760 children books. At the April 14 meeting, the Anniversary Display was discussed for Romer's Store and the 4-H puppet show at the library was reviewed. Since \$40,000 had been received from the Mercer County Commissioners and no building had been started, a group of concerned citizens, including members and officers of 1975 Founding Committee, attended the December 9, 1980 meeting and expressed their concern that they had asked the Mercer County Commissioners for money in 1975 and nothing had been done with the money the Commissioners had given to Granville Township.

Thus, at that December 9, 1980 meeting action was taken which resulted in a new library building. Tom Moorman and Gary Broering volunteered as Co-Chairmen of the Building Committee. Al Homan, Joyce Alig, Judy Heitkamp, Lois Lammers and Cy Schwieterman volunteered as Finance Committee to raise the money needed. 1981 became the year of Reorganization of the Granville Township Library Promoters. At the January 13, 1981 meeting, Building Committee Co-Chairmen Gary Broering and Tom Moorman reported that the site where the old school lot is on Main Street was their first choice for a building site, and that they were discussing this with the St. Henry Consolidated School District Board of Education. Two months later, March 10, they reported that the Board of Education would sell the 110 foot square lot for \$12,500. The finance Committee reported that Sharon Westgerdes McBride, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Westgerdes, Jr., would design the logo for the Granville Township Branch Library Promoters. The spring monthly meetings, held the second Tuesday of the month on a regular basis, continued with the Building Committee working hard on building plans and the Finance Committee seeking clarification of the Financial Status of the Granville Township Branch Library, in view of the \$40,000 Revenue Sharing funds and the earned interest. President Jane Woods and Librarian Bea Lammers were visiting area libraries, as were the Building Committee members, seeking a better under-

standing of the needs of the new library. Legal advice was sought for better understanding of the responsibilities of the Mercer County District Library Board of Trustees and the Granville Township Library Promoters and the Granville Township Citizens.

At the June 9, 1981 meeting of the Mercer County Budget Commission; Walter Fortener, Mercer County Treasurer and Jeffrey Ingraham, Assistant Prosecuting Attorney and Roger Schwieterman, Mercer County Auditor, met with Granville Township Library Promoters' President Jane Woods and Finance Committee members Al Homan and Joyce Alig. The Promoters presented a request for \$25,000 for 1982 and \$25,000 for 1983 from the Mercer County Collection of Intangible Taxes for the Granville Township Branch Library. Homan and Alig requested that the Budget Commission recognize the amount of funds which the Granville Township Citizens had been paying into the collection, with no return prior to 1976 and with little return from 1976 to 1981. At the November 10 meeting of the Promoters, a Revised Constitution was approved unanimously, in view of the increased responsibilities being accepted by the 1981 members of the Promoters. At the December 8, 1981 meeting, the following officers were elected under the Revised Constitution of the Granville Township Library Promoters: President Jane Woods; Vice-President Cy Schwieterman; Secretary Carol Lewis; Treasurer Ron Stout; Representative Al Homan, St. Henry; Bernice Hoying, Carthagena; Ginny Post, Wendelin; Kathy Hemmelgarn, Burkettsville; and Nancy Subler, Cranberry.

At the February 9, 1982 meeting of the Promoters, Bea Lammers displayed the plaque, "In Memory of Ruth Laux" to be displayed at the Library. Mercer County Librarian Austin Schneider announced the Mercer County District Library Board of Trustees hired Ron Anderson, Defiance, as architect for the Granville Township Branch Library Building for \$2,750. Building Co-Chairmen Tom Moorman and Gary Broering presented the cost estimate for the Library Building, totaling \$89,686. A motion was passed that the Mercer County District Library Board of Trustees be requested to place the funds belonging to the Granville Township Branch Library (including Revenue Sharing, Interest and Intangible Tax Funds) in the St. Henry Bank. Finance Committee Members, Judy Heitkamp and Lois Lammers announced their plans for a "Read-A-Thon" and a Slogan contest for the school children to be held in April. Bea Lammers was presented a plaque in honor of her dedication and service to the Granville Township Branch Library and members wished Bea and her family the best in their new home in Omaha, Nebraska. The position of Branch Librarian was then filled by Janet Borgert and the Assistant Librarian was Ann Huwer.

The 1982 Officers of the Granville Township Library Promoters were President Jane Woods, Vice-President Cy Schwieterman, Secretary Carol Lewis, Treasurer Ron Stout, Representatives: Al Homan, St.

The year 1983 was an active year for the Library Promoters. The February 8 meeting was called to order by Vice-President Gary Broering. Treasurer Ron Stout reported a balance of \$3,479.03 with outstanding bills of over \$1,200.00. Jane Woods reported on the Mercer County District Library Board meeting. Librarian Janet Borgert reported a circulation of 2,300 in January and discussed the February 14 Valentines Party and awards. A glass collection was being held monthly for the benefit of the Library, with the report given by Mildred Ross. The Building and Grounds Committee reported that the wallpapering and carpet had been completed and the linoleum would soon be laid and that the shelving was being installed in the Library building. The tables, made by Gene Subler, were completed. The building was almost ready; moving day was discussed. Gary Broering reported that they talked with an architect for landscape sketches. The donors' plaque was discussed, with Gary Broering, Jane Woods and Mildred Ross working on the information.

The April 12, 1983 meeting was called to order by President Cy Schwieterman with thirteen members present. The Granville Township Library Promoters received their tax exempt number from the Federal Government. Gary Broering reported on the donors' plaque. Librarian Janet Borgert reported a circulation of 3,238 in March.

At the May 10 meeting, total deposits of \$25,491.67 were reported. Treasurer Ron Stout reported that tax papers were ready to go, thanks to the volunteer time of Ralph Huelsman. The Building and Grounds Committee reported the building restrooms were almost complete and that the air conditioners were in; the flagpole was up and 95% of the shrubs were in. Under new business, Finance Chairperson Joyce Alig suggested sending a request to the Mercer County District Library Board of Trustees, that the distribution of the Mercer County taxes to the seven libraries of the county, be based upon the population of each area served by that library.

At the June 14 meeting, Janet Borgert reported that the elementary school had agreed to send each class through the library once every six weeks. The new library hours are Monday through Thursday 1:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. and in September the Library will be open Saturday mornings if needed.

May 15, 1983, the St. Henry Granville Township Branch Library was dedicated. The Granville Township Branch Library Promoters 1983 officers were: President Cy Schwieterman, Vice-President Gary Broering, Secretary Carol Lewis and Treasurer Ron Stout. The Area Representatives were Al Homan, St. Henry; Kathy Hemmelgarn, Burkettsville; Bernice Hoying, Carthagena; Nancy Subler, Cranberry; Ginny Post, Wendelin. The Membership Chairwoman was Mildred

Ross, who kept extensive records of all the members and their addresses. The Mercer County District Library Board of Trustees were: Ralph Ording, Robert Cron, Aileen Bernard, Margaret Snyder, Ardyth Schaffer, Harley Jones and Marie McClurg; Austin Schneider was Librarian of the Mercer County District Library in 1983. Janet Borgert was Granville Township Branch Librarian; Anna Huwer and Pat Kunk were assistants. In addition to County Funding for this Library, local Endowment memberships of over \$1,000 were: Beckman and Gast Co., St. Henry American Legion Auxiliary; St. Henry Bank; St. Henry Community Picnic; St. Henry Daughters of Isabella; St. Henry Hospital Auxiliary; St. Henry Tile and Concrete Co., Inc.; and Werling and Sons Slaughter House. Gift Memberships of \$500 to \$999 were: Alfred and Bernadine Homan, St. Henry Band Boosters, St. Henry Community Club, Cy Schwieterman, Inc., In Memory of Wally Post and In Memory of Henry Schneider (father of Librarian Austin Schneider). Sixty-five citizens and businesses and organizations each donated \$100 to \$499 to this Library.

At the July 12 meeting Mildred Ross presented \$50 from the glass collection and \$53 from the Boy Scouts' Troop which had disbanded. Jane Woods brought the newspaper article about the Mercer County Budget hearing on July 18 for the Libraries.

At the September 1983 meeting, the Promoters discussed that in past years, the Library Promoters had been invited to attend the County Budget Hearing. This year they had not received that letter of invitation. It was also noted that at the Mercer County Budget Hearing, that the other two Branch Libraries of the Mercer County District Library, Mendon and Marion, had attended but no person from St. Henry was present.

At the October 11, 1983 meeting, Ron Stout reported a balance of \$3,498.27, plus additional donations. St. Henry citizen Louis Huelsman was appointed by Court of Common Pleas Judge Dean James to the Mercer County District Library Board of Trustees.

The Granville Township Library Promoters continued helping the Granville Township Branch Library in 1983, 1984 and 1985. But the attendance at the meetings began to decline, probably because the Library had been built and was doing very well. In the year 1985, the total circulation for the library was 34,410, compared to a circulation rate of 100,870 at the Mercer County District Library Building at Celina, 11,654 at Mendon-Union and 29,353 at Marion libraries. The 1986 Circulation rate for St. Henry Library was 37,715 compared to 106,118 at the Celina building; 17,292 at the Mendon building; and 37,266 at the Marion building.

In 1986, Library Promoters' meetings were held every other month, with some of those being canceled. At the September 1986 meeting, it was noted by citizens present, that no quorum of officers and representatives had been present at any one meeting the entire year. These citizens asked about seeking local citizens who would be interested in serving actively in 1987. Then, at the October 1986 meeting, all officers and representatives were present. A nominating committee was appointed and at the last meeting of 1986, the 1987 officers were elected.

January 1987, the meeting was opened by Granville Township Library Promoters' President Al Homan. Secretary Anita Hemmelgarn gave her report and Treasurer Jane Schmitz gave that report. Mercer County District Librarian Austin Schneider reported on total circulation statistics. The discussion arose about buying books for the local library, whether the Promoters should pay for the books or the fund from the Mercer County District Library be used. Mr. Schneider commented that about \$4,000 was budgeted for 1987 for books for the St. Henry Branch Library. Mercer County District Library Trustee Ralph Ording said that the County budget should be used first, then the Library Promoters could consider using Library Promoters' funds. A discussion was held about ways to encourage the citizens of Granville Township to use the library. Vice-President Mary Dippold expressed an interest in encouraging senior citizens to visit the library. The possibility of inviting speakers to the meetings was discussed. President Al Homan suggested the need for an evaluation of this library, to see where it might be improved and what kinds of books the citizens want. He appointed Joyce Alig Chairman and Bob Miller to this Evaluation Committee. The plans for the 1987 St. Henry Sesquicentennial celebration were outlined. The library has agreed to serve as one of the sites where the public information can be provided for the Sesquicentennial. The library will have a float in the Sesquicentennial parade in July 1987.

Al Homan, President, was asked for a copy of his 1987 goals for the Granville Township Library Promoters. These goals are listed.

Goals for 1987

By: Al Homan, President, Granville Township Library Promoters Date: January 1987

My goal, as President of the Granville Township Library Promoters, is to determine how we can be of better service to our Community of Granville Township.

First, we should evaluate our local library to determine our strengths and weaknesses. What are the areas of our library which are serving the people well? In what areas are we lacking? It appears as if a lot of people are going elsewhere to get certain kinds of books. Our school students are going to other libraries. How can we provide services to these people? I will appoint an EVALUATION TEAM from inside and outside our Community to study this.

Second, we should try to stir up an interest in our adult people to use this library. Possibly, we could have several open houses and explain the use of the library and the services available.

Third, we should review our Constitution. Does every Officer and Community Representative have a current copy of the Granville Township Library Promoters' Constitution? Does every Officer and Community Representative know his responsibilities and opportunities? Is that person ready to accept these guidelines? A quorum of the executive board is a necessity at each monthly meeting. No business can be legally accomplished without this quorum.

Fourth, we should cooperate with the Sesquicentennial Committee of St. Henry throughout the summer of 1987, not only for activities, but also for central office space.

Knights of Columbus

Sunday, January 9, 1926, at the C.K. of A. Hall in St. Henry, a meeting of Catholic men was held for the purpose of organizing a local Knights of Columbus Council for St. Henry and surrounding parishes. Over 100 good Catholic men decided to form the Knights of Columbus Council No. 2640 and the charter was issued on May 8, 1927. The first regular meeting was held on May 27, 1927 with A.J. Hartings serving as Grand Knight and Joe Dues as Deputy Grand Knight.

In the early 1930's, the Council fell victim to hard times and money was borrowed to keep the organization charter intact. From 1935 to 1945, meetings were suspended due to financial difficulties. In 1949, the outbreak of polio caused cancellation of meetings and a monthly newsletter was begun.

In 1950, a new Knights of Columbus Council was established in Fort Recovery with the help of 2640 and members in that area then joined the newly formed Council.

The Knights of Columbus is an association of Catholic men faithful to the Church and dedicated to the principles of charity, unity, fraternity and patriotism. The challenge is to make Christ's Church present and operative in the world.

Council 2640 has been active in many community programs such as League of Decency, blood donors, etc. They also support various programs for the recreation and religious good of youth. Together with over 1,200,000 other men, Council 2640 supports many National and State endeavors of the Knights of Columbus which include programs of social action: right-to-life, anti-abortion, drug abuse education, antipoverty, mental health, ecology, decency and retardation.

The 1985-86 Grand Knight is Mark Evers. The 1986-87 Grand Knight is Lavern Shultz. The first spiritual director was Rev. Pius Kanney of St. Henry Parish. The present chaplain is Rev. Werner Verhoff of Burkettsville.

St. Henry Commercial Club

The St. Henry Commercial Club was organized and incorporated under the laws of the State of Ohio as a non-profit organization on July 24, 1907. Their purpose was to induce manufacturing plants and other business enterprises to locate in St. Henry. The charter members were H.A. Beckman, F.H. Goettemoeller, Alfred Davis, Edward Schmitz, J.J. Romer, William H. Romer and Joseph J. Moeller. The Club's membership increased to 40 active members by 1937. The following are some of the projects sponsored by the Commercial Club: their drive for better telephone service was climaxed by the installation of the dial system; their drive to have all the gravel roads in St. Henry resurfaced resulted in St. Henry having all hard surfaced roads; through their efforts 28,000 square feet of sidewalk were put down; their efforts secured a reduction in the fire insurance rates: the 1200 trees raised in the Commercial Club nursery were given to property owners; they put new welcome signs at the edge of town; they have the Christmas Lighting Contest. They plan the Combined Chairities Drive each year. Many St. Henry organizations helped with the park and the pool. The Swimming Pool received donations from the Commercial Club. Donations have also been made to the Shelter House at the St. Henry Park.

The St. Henry Commercial Club conducts the St. Henry Picnic Ticket Sales which is the sole source of their income. The total revenue from these ticket sales is donated 100% back to Community Projects. At present, the Commercial Club has about 24 members.

The St. Henry Emergency Branch of Mercer County Ambulance Service, which came into being when Don Hummel became interested in the project, is strictly a volunteer unit. Their first meeting was held February 2, 1975. A lot was then purchased from the Ed Zumberge property located at Linn and Main Streets. The building, built by The Bud Wagner Construction Co. of Coldwater and leased to Mercer County, was designed to house two emergency vehicles and equipment. The building was dedicated and open house held on September 14, 1975. Junior Robbins was county co-ordinator at this time. The St. Henry Squad began making runs at 9:50 p.m. on September 19, 1975, when the first monitoring equipment was received.

Charter members are: Harold Bergman, James Braun, Barb Brophy, Susan Brophy, Ethel Bruns, Gerald Bruns, Johanna Bruns, Ann Evers, Eugene Evers, Donald Frilling, Jeff Frilling, Mildred Frilling, Arthur Gerlach, Carl Hart, Stella Heitkamp, Thomas Henry, Marge Hoying, William Huber, Marie Hummel, Clete Lange, Edna Lange, Daniel Link, Marcia Link, Owen Rinderle, Leroy Rutschilling, Doris Rutschilling, Robert Cramer, Harold Dorsten, Thelma Fortkamp, Walter Fortkamp, Don Hummel, Joan Hummel, Rose Mary Moeder, Victor Moeder, Margaret Schmit and Carol Wehrkamp. Of this original group four remain active: Don Hummel, Vic Moeder, Rose Mary Moeder and Barb Brophy. A good many of the original members retired after 10 years of service.

The St. Henry Squad is set up with four squads on the day shift and four squads on the night shift, therefore, each squad is "on call" one week of each month.

In February of 1983 St. Henry received a back-up emergency vehicle and equipment. They are fully equipped to handle any emergency; thanks to the generosity and caring of the local residents the St. Henry squad is equipped with a heart monitor, defibrillators, Hurst tool of life, plus many more items.

Since the inception of the St. Henry Emergency Squad, in 1975, the following people, along with the charter members, have completed the emergency medical technicians training: Tina Balster, Larry Benanzer, Cindy Brunswick, Mary Buzard, Dennis Hemmelgarn, Michael Henry, Beth Hummel, Gayle Johnson, Charles Knueve, Tom Lamm, Mark Osterholt, Nancy Ross, James Rutschilling, Linda Thieman, Edward Wellman, Diana Borger, Bob Brown, Don Bruns, Bonnie Gelhaus, Doris Goecke, Pat Hummel, Harold Balster, Larry Dues, Dick Franck, Dan Thieman, Carol Lange, Carl Spangler, John Huelsman, Nancy Prashun, Jeanne Rosenbeck, Leisa Rutschilling, Doris Schultz, Janice Schlarman, Mark VanTrees, Mike Wurst, Bill Mueller, Bill Dysert, Roger Speck, Kathy Unrast, Margaret Rinderle, Jeff Rinderle, Brenda Nieport, Bonnie Knapke, Gene Figel, Dennis Giere, Mike Laux, Chris Lefeld, Tom Mescher, Steve Osterholt, Mary Kay Rammel, Elmer Rinderle, Janice Rindler, Duane Sanning, Dave Selhorst, Kim Wellman. Several of these people transferred to the Coldwater Squad when their community received an emergency vehicle.

As volunteers these people have been trained as emergency medical technicians. Their training consists of 60 hours of classroom, six hours vital signs and 20 hours of in hospital training. Once they have completed the proper schooling and passed the state tests they are put "on call" for either the 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. shift or the shift from 6:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. from Wednesday to Wednesday.

At the present time there are 37 active members providing care for the southern Mercer County Area. Several of the squad members are para-medics as well as CPR and first-aid instructors. These instructors provide classes to anyone interested.

Present officers are Bob Brown, president; Linda Thieman, vice president; Doris Schultz, secretary-treasurer; Bill Mueller, squad chief; Dan Thieman, assistant squad chief; Don Bruns, member-atlarge; and Ed Wellman, member-at-large.



The St. Henry Volunteer Fire Department was formed after the late summer fire of 1905, which burned the Bruns Hotel, the carriage and Smith's workshop and nearby buildings and threatened the entire town. Fire fighting equipment was purchased. A better water supply was made available to the village in 1909 with a water tower. A 1917 Model T truck was bought in 1924. This truck was overhauled in 1970 and is driven in parades. In the 1940's, equipment for the trucks and men was provided by Granville Township and the people of St. Henry. An additional truck was bought in 1950. The firehouse was built and dedicated in August 1958. A Rural Firemens' Association was formed in 1960. A grass fire truck was constructed in 1970. The Fire Department Auxiliary was formed in 1969 and their duty is to take lunch to the firemen when fighting big fires.

In 1978 the department bought foam fighting equipment. In 1982, a pager alert system replaced the blowing of the siren. In March of 1984, a fund drive was initiated with an Arson Association training program was formed. In the fall of 1984, a goal of \$25,000.00 for the purpose of updating equipment to comply with state code to keep fire insurance rates down for property owners. A new grass fire truck was purchased in March of 1986 also with the help of the fund drive for a price of \$18,000.00. The old equipment from the previous grass truck was installed on the new truck. At present there are 27 active firemen with Jerry Bruns, Chief; Ron Ontrop, Assistant Chief; Jeff Buehler, President; Dan Bruns, Vice President; and Matt Cahill, Secretary-Treasurer. The Auxiliary has 21 current members with Kathy Droesch, President; Merdella Nietfeld, Secretary; and Ruth Delzeith, Treasurer. The St. Henry Volunteer Fire Department was formed in 1905 with John Andress appointed the first Fire Chief.

The St. Henry American Legion Post was first chartered in August, 1946, by the Department of Ohio, and designated Post 648. There were nineteen veterans of World War I and World War II who signed the original application for the charter. Over the years, since that first step, Post 648 has provided strong support for community and youth activities, love for our state and nation and the care of the disabled veteran and his or her dependents.

For several of the early years, the Legion members met in the old Commercial Club, which would now be above Huelsman's Automotive Store, but at that time it was known as the Mupps Bruns Grocery Store. Then, in November of 1949, Post 648 entered into a lease/purchase agreement with Julius and Pauline Rose to take over the ownership of what had been popularly known as the "Land of Dance" bar and dance hall. The building was remodelled to provide for a bar and restaurant on the west side and a meeting and dance area on the east side of the building. In the years to follow, numerous improvements were made to the original structure. The bar and restaurant part, known as the St. Henry Nite Club, has been a gathering place for area people for many years and is currently leased to Steve Koesters.

The Legion has always been a ready donator to civic activities, scholarship awards, children's Christmas parties, summer baseball programs, Buckeye Boys State, the Veteran's hospitals and the Ohio Veterans Children's Home picnics. Also, the members of Post 648 were large contributors and volunteer workers for the very successful St. Henry Park and Swimming Pool project.

Perhaps the most important single project that the members started back in the year 1947 in order to raise funds for a building purchase was the 4th of July picnic. For several years the Legion was the sole sponsor of this annual activity until the St. Henry Fire Department needed funds for a new truck and became a co-sponsor. Over the years other local organizations have been added to the project until today it is truly a community picnic. The American Legion Post is still the primary organizer and its Commander automatically serves as the General Chairman.

The most recent noteworthy project that the American Legion Post has spearheaded has been the campaign to acquire and display some fifty American flags along the Main Street of the Village of St. Henry on all of the important patriotic holidays. Although several other community organizations have helped financially in this activity, it has been the members of Post 648 who were responsible for the purchasing, installation and maintenance of the flags.

The first meetings were held above what is now Huelsman Automotive Inc., and continued until the Legion purchased the Land-O-Dance (which they converted into their new home) in 1949.

The Auxiliary is noted for its Child Welfare, Community Service, Americanism and Veterans Administration and Rehabilitation programs throughout the year. The Auxiliary helps with the Children's Christmas Party, conducts a Baby-sitting course, and a fingerprinting clinic, giving gifts to shut-ins and helping with expenses of Art Bernard's Santa's house at Christmas time and also is in charge of the bingo Stand at the 4th of July Weekend community Picnic.

Each year there is a sale of Veteran made poppies. Over the years, forty-one girls have been sponsored by the Auxiliary to attend Buckeye Girls State. This is a government workshop designed to teach the responsibilities of citizenship.

There are thirteen ladies in the Marching unit which was formed in early 1970. The Gold Star Mothers were our very special members. They gave a son to our country. They are Sophia (Buschur) Delzeith, Rose Wimmers, Stella Brunswick, Loretta Siefring and Regina Bernard.


